DEAR DR. ISAAC, JOHN ROYAL AND MEMBERS OF THE CPSAS,

WE APPRECIATE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO BRING TO THE COUNCIL'S AND SUBPANEL'S ATTENTION A MATTER OF CONCERN TO US: THE APPARENT LACK OF FOCUSED REPRESENTATION FOR CALIFORNIA WETFISH PROCESSORS, AND PARTICULARLY, SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PROCESSORS, ON THE CPS ADVISORY SUBPANEL AS IT IS NOW CONSTITUTED.

THROUGHOUT THE HISTORY OF THE WETFISH FISHERIES THAT NOW ARE GOVERNED UNDER THE CPS FISHERY MANAGEMENT PLAN, CALIFORNIA HAS PRODUCED BY FAR THE MAJORITY OF LANDINGS. FOR EXAMPLE, CALIFORNIA LANDED 83 TO 93 PERCENT OF THE TOTAL WEST COAST CATCH OF SARDINES DURING THE PERIOD 1915 TO 1951. IN THE YEAR 2000, ACCORDING TO TABLE 15 - POUNDAGE AND VALUE OF COMMERCIAL LANDINGS INTO CALIFORNIA BY AREA, COMPILED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME, SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PORTS (INCLUDING SANTA BARBARA, LOS ANGELES AND SAN DIEGO AREAS) LANDED 80 PERCENT OF THE PACIFIC SARDINES HARVESTED STATEWIDE (MORE THAN 93 MILLION POUNDS OF THE 116.136 MILLION POUNDS HARVESTED). SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PORTS ALSO LANDED 94 PERCENT OF THE STATEWIDE SQUID HARVEST (MORE THAN 244.2 MILLION POUNDS OF THE TOTAL HARVEST OF 259.669 MILLION POUNDS). IN ADDITION, SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PRODUCED THE LION'S SHARE OF THE PACIFIC MACKEREL CATCH (46.715 MILLION POUNDS OF THE TOTAL 46.786 MILLION POUNDS HARVESTED).

NOTWITHSTANDING THE IMPORTANCE OF THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PROCESSING SECTOR IN THE CPS FISHERIES, CURRENTLY NO ONE ON THE CPS ADVISORY SUBPANEL EXCLUSIVELY REPRESENTS SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PROCESSING INTERESTS, OR FOR THAT MATTER, CALIFORNIA INTERESTS. THE EXISTING PROCESSOR REPRESENTATIVES ALL HAVE AT LEAST A PARTIAL INTEREST IN THE EMERGING FISHERIES NOW DEVELOPING IN THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST.

TO DATE THE POTENTIAL FOR CONFLICTS OF INTEREST HAS BEEN SUBMERGED, AS THE PACIFIC SARDINE BIOMASS HAS BEEN SUFFICIENT TO SATISFY ALL NEEDS. HOWEVER.

AND MEMBERS OF THE CPSAS

INKLINGS OF FUTURE ALLOCATION CONFLICTS HAVE ARISEN WITH THE PUSH BY SOME PROCESSING INTERESTS TO ABANDON THE EXISTING SARDINE QUOTA SYSTEM AND INSTITUTE INSTEAD A COASTWIDE QUOTA. SUCH A CHANGE, WE BELIEVE, WOULD NOT SERVE THE BEST INTERESTS OF CALIFORNIA PROCESSORS. WE HAVE IDEAS ON HOW TO ADDRESS THE SARDINE ALLOCATION ISSUE. YET AS THE CPSAS IS NOW CONSTITUTED, WE HAVE NO VOICE; THE ADVISORY SUBPANEL IS WEIGHTED TO FAVOR PROCESSING INTERESTS IN THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST.

TO RESOLVE THIS BREWING DILEMNA, WE REQUEST THAT AN ADDITIONAL SEAT BE ADDED TO THE CPS ADVISORY SUBPANEL TO REPRESENT SOLELY CALIFORNIA, AND SPECIFICALLY, SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA, PROCESSING INTERESTS. WE WOULD GREATLY APPRECIATE A DIRECT SEAT AT THE TABLE, WHERE OUR VIEWS MAY BE CONSIDERED ALONG WITH OTHERS. WE NOMINATE DIANE PLESCHNER-STEELE TO REPRESENT THE INTERESTS OF CALIFORNIA'S WETFISH INDUSTRY, AND SPECIFICALLY THOSE OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PROCESSORS.

WE LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING COOPERATIVELY WITH ALL SECTORS OF THE CPS FISHERIES TO ARRIVE AT CONSERVATION AND MANAGEMENT MEASURES BASED ON THE BEST SCIENCE AND EQUITABLE TO ALL INDUSTRY PARTICIPANTS.

THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR SERIOUS CONSIDERATION OF OUR CONCERNS AND OUR REQUEST.

APPOINTMENTS TO ADVISORY BODIES, STANDING COMMITTEES, AND OTHER FORUMS

<u>Situation</u>: The following administrative issues require Council guidance and action on appointments to advisory bodies as described below.

- 1. Elimination of tribal seats on the Salmon Advisory Subpanel (SAS) At its April 2002 meeting, the Council stated its intent to eliminate the three tribal seats on the SAS (Washington coastal, Columbia River, and California). This recommendation arose when the Council discussed the status of the California tribal seats on the Salmon Advisory Subpanel (SAS) and Habitat Committee (HC) which have been held by the Yurok and Hoopa Valley Indian tribes. Mr. Harp noted the co-manager status of the tribes and the manner of their representation before the full Council and in other forums (e.g., Klamath Fishery Management Council and North of Cape Falcon Forum) in which tribal representatives are directly recognized along with the other management entities. In contrast, the advisory subpanels generally consist of non-management representatives of the fishing industry, public, and conservation entities. In light of these facts, the open nature of subpanel deliberations, and the need for efficiency and effectiveness of the Council advisory process, the Council agreed to communicate its intent to consider eliminating all tribal positions on the SAS at its June 2002 meeting. The Council clarified that this action does not affect the tribal fisherman position on the Groundfish Advisory Subpanel or tribal representation on the HC or any other advisory bodies.
- 2. Creation of a new position on the Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC) to be filled by a scientist from the Northwest Fishery Science Center (NWFSC) with expertise in groundfish population dynamics At its April 2002 meeting, the Council stated its intent to create and fill this position to help meet the increasing demands of groundfish management. The NWFSC has nominated Dr. Han-Lin Lai to the new position (Closed Session, Attachment 1).
- 3. Creation of a new position on the Groundfish Management Team (GMT) to be filled by a tribal scientist with groundfish expertise At its April 2002 meeting, the Council stated its intent to create and fill this position to help meet the increasing demands of groundfish management. The Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission has nominated Mr. Robert Jones to this new position (Closed Session, Attachment 2).
- 4. Clarify status of additional state assistance to the GMT The Council has increased funding by 10% to the three coastal state contracts (Washington, Oregon, and California) to help pay for additional assistance to the GMT. The Council should clarify the status of the three individuals providing this assistance to the GMT (e.g., three additional state GMT positions). Nominees to the GMT must submit their Curriculum Vitae to the SSC for review and comment, and be formally approved by the Council.
- 5. Consider a request to add a southern California processor position to the Coastal Pelagic Species Advisory Subpanel (CPSAS) Exhibit B.1.iv, Supplemental Attachment 1, contains a letter requesting the Council to create and fill this position with Ms. Diane Pleschner. If the Council wishes to create such a position, it should announce that intent and solicit nominations for action in September. Currently, the CPSAS consists of 11 members (see Council Roster) of which three are processors (Mr. Joe Cappuccio, Salinas; Mr. A. Marchand, Illawco; and Ms. Heather Munro, Waldport).

Council Action:

- 1. Confirm Council intent to eliminate tribal seats on the SAS.
- 2. Create a new position and approve appointment of a NWFSC scientist to the SSC.
- 3. Create a new position and approve appointment of a tribal scientist to the GMT
- 4. Clarify status of additional state assistance to the GMT.
- 5. Provide guidance on the request to add a southern processor to the CPSAS.

Dear Mr. Lohn:

This letter is to once again voice the Quileute Tribe's serious disappointment with NMFS's continuing failure to take any action to protect the Tribe's treaty crabbing rights. The Tribe hereby informs NMFS that the Tribe is preparing to file suit against Commerce and NMFS if they do not take prompt remedial action.

NMFS has paid only fleeting attention to the Tribe's repeated and consistent demands over the last eight months. Since October 2001, the Tribe has presented compelling evidence on numerous occasions of the State of Washington's mismanagement of the Dungeness crab fishery off the Washington coast, and has explained how this mismanagement has prevented the Tribe from taking its 50% treaty share of the resource for many years. The Tribe presented this evidence to NMFS representatives at a meeting in early December 2001, and has supplemented that information in letters dated January 11, 2002, February 7, 2002, and March 13, 2002. NMFS's only response to the Tribe has been a perfunctory letter dated February 12, 2002, in which NMFS asked a few questions about the crab fishery. Although the Tribe had already addressed those issues, it nevertheless responded with a letter dated March 13, 2002, once again setting forth the reasons why immediate federal action was necessary to protect the Tribe's treaty fishing rights. As of today's date, some two months later, the Tribe has still not received any response from NMFS to the Tribe's March 13 letter, and NMFS has given no indication that it will take action to protect the Tribe's treaty rights in any way.

Tribal representatives were informed by Bill Robinson last week that NMFS will be responding the Tribe's March 13, 2002 letter at some unspecified time in the coming few weeks. The Tribe eagerly anticipates that response and sincerely hopes that NMFS responds with prompt remedial action, and not with further questions or suggestions that a solution be sought elsewhere.

Please understand that the Tribe takes this matter very seriously. The Tribe demands both that NMFS take short-term action (such as implementation of emergency regulations and/or other interim measures) and long-term action (such as the development of an FMP

for Dungeness crab) sufficient to protect the Tribes' treaty fishing rights. There is no dispute that NMFS and Commerce have fiduciary duties to protect treaty fishing rights and to ensure that fisheries are managed in a manner that ensures the Tribe's right to take their 50% share of the resource. Washington v. Daley, 173 F.3d 1158 (9th Cir. 1999); Parravano v. Brown, 70 F.3d 539 (9th Cir. 1995). The Ninth Circuit has held that this duty requires Commerce and NMFS to implement emergency regulations to protect treaty fishing rights where, as here, those treaty rights are jeopardized by non-treaty harvests. See, e.g., Parravano v. Brown, 70 F.3d 539 (9th Cir. 1995). These obligations are not affected in the least by the State's involvement in management of the crab resource or by alternate means the Tribe might have to resolve disputes with the State. The Tribe looks to NMFS as the party to work with the Tribe to solve this pressing issue, as NMFS has non-delegable fiduciary obligations to the Tribe.

The Tribe is concerned that it will be necessary to file suit in the very near future if NMFS does not promptly take satisfactory action. Prior to doing so, the Tribe would like to meet with NMFS representatives one last time. The Tribe prefers that this meeting take place within the next two weeks, and that both policy and legal representatives attend. Please contact me at your earliest convenience to arrange for such a meeting.

The Tribe looks forward to hearing from you as soon as possible.
