## PRESEASON SALMON MANAGEMENT SCHEDULE FOR 2010

The following schedule will be used to plan, announce, and meet *Federal Register* deadlines for public hearing sites and the entire 2010 preseason salmon management process.

For 2010, Council staff recommends one salmon management option hearing per coastal state, the same schedule as in 2009. The hearings would be:

March 29, 2010 Westport, Washington and Coos Bay, Oregon March 30, 2010 Eureka, California

In 2010, the March Council meeting will occur in Sacramento, California and the April Council meeting in Portland, Oregon. Therefore, the public comment period on Tuesday of the April meeting in Portland also serves as a public comment opportunity. If the states desire to have additional hearings, we suggest they organize and staff them as was done in past years. The table below provides the public attendance at the hearing sites since 1996 for Council reference.

## PACIFIC FISHERY MANAGEMENT COUNCIL SCHEDULE AND PROCESS FOR DEVELOPING 2010 OCEAN SALMON FISHERY MANAGEMENT MEASURES

- Oct-30-Nov5, The Council and advisory entities meet at the Hilton Orange County, Costa 2009 Mesa, California, to consider any changes to conservation objectives or methodologies used in the development of abundance projections or regulatory options.
- Jan. 19-22, The Salmon Technical Team (STT) and NMFS economist meet in Portland,
  Oregon to draft *Review of 2009 Ocean Salmon Fisheries*. This report summarizes seasons, quotas, harvest, escapement, socioeconomic statistics, achievement of management goals, and impacts on species listed under the Endangered Species Act. (February 9 print date, available on-line February 12.)
- Feb. 16-19 STT meets in Portland, Oregon to complete Preseason Report I Stock Abundance Analysis for 2010 Ocean Salmon Fisheries. This report provides key salmon stock abundance estimates and level of precision, harvest and escapement estimates when recent regulatory regimes are projected on 2010 abundance, and other pertinent information to aid development of management options (February 24 print date, February 25 mailed to the Council and available on-line).
- Feb. 20 State and tribal agencies hold constituent meetings to review preseason abundance projections and range of probable fishery options.
- Mar. 5
- Feb. 25 Council reports summarizing the 2009 salmon season and salmon stock abundance projections for 2010 are available to the public from the Council office.
- Mar. 6-11 Council and advisory entities meet at the DoubleTree Hotel Sacramento, California, to adopt 2010 regulatory options for public review. The Council addresses inseason action for fisheries opening prior to May 1 and adopts preliminary options on March 8, adopts tentative options for STT analysis on March 9, and final options for public review on March 11.
- Mar. 15-19 The STT completes *Preseason Report II: Analysis of Proposed Regulatory Options for 2010 Ocean Salmon Fisheries* (March 22 print date, March 23 available to the public).
- Mar. 17 Management agencies, tribes, and public develop their final recommendations for the regulatory options. North of Cape Falcon Forum meetings are scheduled for March 17-18 in Lacy, Washington and April 6-8 in Lynwood, Washington.
- Mar. 23 Council staff distributes *Preseason Report II: Analysis of Proposed Regulatory Options for 2010 Ocean Salmon Fisheries* to the public. The report includes the public hearing schedule, comment instructions, option highlights, and tables summarizing the biological and economic impacts of the proposed management options.

- Mar. 29-30 Sites and dates of public hearings to review the Council's proposed regulatory options are: Westport, Washington (March 29); Coos Bay, Oregon (March 29); and Eureka, California (March 30). Comments on the options will also be taken during the Council meeting on April 12 in Portland, Oregon.
- Apr. 10-15 Council and advisory entities meet to adopt final regulatory measures at the Sheraton Portland Airport Hotel, Portland, Oregon. *Preseason Report II: Analysis of Proposed Regulatory Options for 2010 Ocean Salmon Fisheries* and information developed at the Council meeting is considered during the course of the week. The Council will tentatively adopt final regulatory measures for analysis by the STT on April 12. Final adoption of recommendations to National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) are tentatively scheduled to be completed on April 14.
- Apr. 15-21 The STT and Council staff completes *Preseason Report III: Analysis of Council-Adopted Regulatory Measures for 2010 Ocean Salmon Fisheries* (April 22 print date, mailed to the Council and available to the public April 23). Council and NMFS staff completes required National Environmental Policy Act documents for submission.
- Apr. 23 Council staff distributes adopted ocean salmon fishing management recommendations, and *Preseason Report III* is made available to the public.
- May 1 NMFS implements federal ocean salmon fishing regulations.

Dear Dr. McIsaac,

As we discussed at the Pacific Fishery Management Council's April 2009 meeting, the Olympic Coast National Marine Sanctuary (OCNMS) is in the process of revising its management plan. The purpose of this correspondence is to provide PFMC with a brief update on what we've accomplished since April and to provide some information on our next steps. The information referenced in this letter can be viewed in detail at the OCNMS 'Navigating the Future' web page,

http://olympiccoast.noaa.gov/protection/mpr/welcome.html.

At its May meeting the OCNMS Advisory Council (AC) reached consensus on how to move forward with the high priority issues identified during public scoping and the AC's internal issue prioritization process. This agreement is documented in a Priority Issue Work Plan. The priority issues identified in the work plan are:

- Fulfill Treaty Trust Responsibility
- Achieve effective Collaborative and Coordinated Management
- Conduct Collaborative Research, Assessments and Monitoring to Inform Ecosystem-Based Management (EBM)
- Improve Ocean Literacy
- Conserve Natural Resources in the Sanctuary
- Understand the Sanctuary's Cultural, Historical and Socioeconomic Significance

The AC and OCNMS agreed that these issues should be addressed through a combination of staff work, interagency or intergovernmental discussions, working groups and workshops. To date one working group has completed their work, which was to revise OCNMS's goals and objectives. These revised goals and objectives were reviewed by the AC and forwarded to OCNMS with the recommendation that they be adopted. I have accepted the AC's recommendation and the revised goals and objectives will serve to inform the rest of the management plan review process. The revised goals and objectives will be subject to public comment, along with proposed action plans, at the time the draft management plan is published.



We currently have three working groups that are actively meeting. They are chaired by AC members and staffed with national marine sanctuary staff. They are scheduled to complete their work at the end of the calendar year. These working groups are:

- Collaborative Research, Assessment and Monitoring to Inform EBM Working Group
- Living Resource Conservation Working Group
- Spill Prevention, Preparedness, Response and Restoration Working Group

In addition we are working with the AC to hold three workshops:

- Socioeconomic Values of Resources in the Sanctuary Workshop
- Ocean Literacy Workshop
- Maritime Heritage Workshop

The aim of the working groups and workshops is to bring together outside experts in these topics together with sanctuary staff in order to develop specific strategies and activities for inclusion in the draft management plan. These strategies and activities will serve as the foundation of the management plan. Currently, there are approximately 80 outside experts participating in the three working groups; and approximately 190 outside experts are being invited to attend the three workshops.

In addition to staffing the working groups and workshops, OCNMS staff are discussing potential strategies with partner agencies and governments to inform a Collaborative and Coordinated Management action plan, and working on recommendations for a Sanctuary Operations action plan. Preliminary drafts of these documents were presented at the AC's September 2009 meeting.

All recommended strategies and activities – whether developed by working groups, workshops or staff – will be reviewed by the AC at their November 2009 and January 2010 meetings. OCNMS will forward AC recommendations to the IPC for review and comment. OCNMS will consider both AC and IPC comments and recommendations when drafting action plans for the revised management plan. We aim to have these draft action plans completed in time to be able to brief PFMC at its April meeting.
