UPDATE LIST OF FISHERIES

At its June 2012 meeting, the Council recommended preventing the future development of fisheries for currently unfished forage fish species through a two-stage process: 1) amending and updating the Federal list of authorized West Coast fisheries and gear, and 2) developing protections for unfished and unmanaged forage fish through amendments to one or more of the Council's fishery management plans. At this meeting, the Council is scheduled to take final action on the first step in this process, and to begin planning for the second step.

A revised version of the List of Fisheries appeared first in the April Briefing Book (<u>April 2013</u>, <u>Agenda Item H.1.a</u>, <u>Attachment 2</u>). This list was subsequently edited and reviewed by Council advisory bodies in June 2013. At that time, the Council reviewed the revised list and recommended changes. The ad hoc Ecosystem Workgroup (EW), created in June, made revisions in accord with Council guidance and has provided a revised version of the list for this meeting (Agenda Item I.1, Attachment 1).

At this stage, the Council is scheduled to develop recommendations to National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) to update the Federal list of fisheries and gear. When final, the Council will transmit those recommendations, along with any accompanying analyses, to NMFS, requesting publication of a proposed rule to implement the recommendations. NMFS would then publish the proposed rule and, after an appropriate public comment period, determine whether to approve, disapprove, or partially approve a final rule implementing revisions to the list.

Agenda Item I.1.a, Attachment 1 provides the current list of authorized fisheries and gear with the EW's suggested revisions. Potential revisions to this table should consider only those fisheries that occur wholly or partially within Federal waters (3-200 nm offshore). No revision to the table should have the effect of prohibiting currently legal directed fisheries or incidental catch.

ECOSYSTEM WORKGROUP REPORT ON REVISING THE FEDERAL LIST OF FISHERIES AND GEAR AUTHORIZED FOR USE IN THE WEST COAST EEZ

Under the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act (MSA) at Section 305(a), the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) is required to maintain a list of all fisheries and fishing gear authorized for use within each Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) area under Council jurisdiction. No person or vessel is permitted to "employ fishing gear or engage in a fishery not included on such list without giving 90 days advance written notice to the appropriate Council..." The list of fisheries essentially prohibits anyone from developing a new fishery without first providing a review opportunity to the appropriate Council. Fisheries not on the list are not prohibited altogether, but Councils may use the 90-day period to comment on, develop a regulatory plan for, or recommend that NMFS prohibit the proposed fishery as appropriate.

At its June 2013 meeting in Garden Grove, California, the Council discussed potential revisions to the Federal list of fisheries and gear authorized for the U.S. West Coast Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ, 3-200 nautical miles offshore) under Agenda Item H.1. At that meeting, the Council provided instructions on making modifications to the proposed revisions to the Federal list of authorized fisheries and gear, and those changes are incorporated in the table below.

Several of the fisheries listed in the table below are divided by latitude line to reflect different fishery regulations in the three coastal states, Washington, Oregon, and California. Fisheries or gear restrictions that occur only off Washington are listed as applying north of 46°15' N. lat. Fisheries or gear restrictions that occur only off Oregon are listed as applying south of 46°15' N. lat. and north of 42° N. lat. Fisheries or gear restrictions that occur only off California are listed as applying south of 42° N. lat. Some fisheries or gear restrictions may apply off two states, or off all three states. If the Council adopts these latitude lines dividing where gear types may be used, those lines would apply to vessels operating in the EEZ regardless of where a vessel was based or the location of the port in which the vessel would land its fish.

The Council will be discussing its recommendations for revising this list at its September 12-17 meeting in Boise, Idaho. Comments on whether this list accurately represents existing West Coast EEZ fisheries would be particularly appreciated.

ECOSYSTEM ADVISORY SUBPANEL REPORT ON UPDATE LIST OF FISHERIES

The Ecosystem Advisory Subpanel (EAS) perceives a potential conflict between the proposed Federal List of Authorized West Coast Exclusive Economic Zone Fisheries and Gear (list of fisheries) in Agenda Item I.1.a, Attachment 1 and the Pacific Fishery Management Council's intent under Fishery Ecosystem Plan Initiative 1 to protect forage species. Item 10 (Squid, all species except market squid) is a broad category that includes species of pelagic squid (e.g. boreal clubhook, neon flying) that are also listed in the draft list of pelagic forage fishes under Initiative 1. The EAS recognizes this as an important issue that is more appropriately resolved under Initiative 1. On this basis, the EAS recommends approval of the proposed list of fisheries.

GROUNDFISH ADVISORY SUBPANEL REPORT ON UPDATE LIST OF FISHERIES

The Groundfish Advisory Subpanel (GAP) received a report from Mr. Mike Burner about updating the list of fisheries. We referred to Agenda Item I.1.a, Attachment 1, the Ecosystem Workgroup Report.

After thorough discussion, we suggest the crab loop be listed in both Oregon and Washington recreational fisheries for use in both the Dungeness crab fishery and crab species other than Dungeness crab.

UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

In April, the Council adopted a Pacific Coast Fishery Ecosystem Plan for the U.S. Portion of the California Current Large Marine Ecosystem (FEP) as a vehicle for bringing ecosystem-based principles into the Council decision-making process under its existing Fishery Management Plans (FMPs). At the same time, the Council adopted an Ecosystem Initiatives Appendix, which provides examples of how the Council could address issues that affect two or more Council FMPs or coordinate major Council policies across the FMPs to fulfill identified FEP needs.

Initiative 1 is intended to recognize the importance of forage fish to the marine ecosystem off of the U.S. West Coast, and to provide adequate protection for forage fish. The Council is not pursuing a permanent moratorium on fishing for forage fish. Instead, the Council's objective is to prohibit the development of new directed fisheries on forage species that are not currently managed by the Council, or the States, until the Council has had an adequate opportunity to assess the science relating to any proposed fishery and any potential impacts to existing fisheries and communities. Under the current rules, there is some risk that fisheries could develop before such analyses could be conducted.

The Council has adopted a two-stage process for implementing FEP Initiative 1: amending and updating the list of authorized fisheries and gear for Federal waters off the U.S. West Coast at 50 CFR 600.725(v), and developing any additional necessary protections for unfished and umanaged forage fish through recommendations to amend one or more of the Council's FMPs. The first step in that process, reviewing and updating the federal list of allowable fisheries and gear, is underway (Agenda Item I.1).

The second stage of the Council's guidance on protecting unfished forage fish is to incorporate any additional needed protections into the current suite of FMPs through an FMP amendment process (Final Council Action at G.1.d, June 2012).

As laid out in the Ecosystem Initiatives Appendix and in the attached Ecosystem Workgroup report, the first step in this process is to draft a list of forage species suitable for additional Council protections under FEP Initiative 1. The Council has adopted the following definition for "forage fish" species, based on a Smith et al. (2011) paper on low trophic level species: *species that are often present in high abundance, forming dense schools or aggregations, and which are generally plankton feeders for a large part of their life cycle*. In November 2011, the Council's Ecosystem Plan Development Team (EPDT) provided the Council with a preliminary draft list of pelagic forage fish species in a table (A.2) now provided in the FEP Appendix. The EPDT's report, and Table A.2., address both managed and unmanaged forage fish species.

Once the Council has defined the set of unmanaged, unfished forage fish species or species groups that fall under its Exclusive Economic Zone-based authority, it should next review the connections those species have to FMP fish and fisheries. After identifying these connections, the Council may then use the FMP amendment process to assign the unfished, unmanaged forage fish species to the appropriate FMP(s) as either fishery management unit (FMU) or ecosystem component species.

After the Council has adopted FMP amendments to add new species or species groups to one or more of its FMPs, and has transmitted those amendments and their accompanying analyses to NMFS, the agency would consider finalizing prohibitions on future fisheries for those species through the Federal rulemaking process. Although the Council could choose to add species to just one of its FMPs, it might also consider a comprehensive amendment to add new species to different FMPs through the same discussion and analysis process, and through a combined rulemaking process to address each of the relevant FMPs.

To summarize, the Council's charges under FEP Initiative 1 are to:

- Broadly define the set of unmanaged, unfished forage fish species or species-groups that fall under its authority;
- Review the connections those species or species groups may have to FMP species as either prey of those species, bycatch within the fisheries managed under the FMP, similarity to FMP species, or other connection to FMP species;
- Develop FMP amendments to add those species to the appropriate FMPs as non-targeted FMU species.

Council Action:

- 1. Review and comment on draft list of pelagic forage species.
- 2. Provide guidance on amending management plans to protect forage species.

COASTAL PELAGIC SPECIES ADVISORY SUBPANEL REPORT ON UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

The Coastal Pelagic Species Advisory Subpanel (CPSAS) and Coastal Pelagic Species Management Team (CPSMT) convened a joint conference call on September 12th to review and discuss the Ecosystem Based Management agenda items for the September Council meeting. We did not have the opportunity to discuss agenda item H.1 (Follow-up from Managing Our Nations Fisheries Conference); however, the CPSAS notes there is a potential intersection and overlap of topics for MSA reauthorization and the Council's current work under FEP Initiative 1: protections for unfished and unmanaged forage fish. The majority of the joint meeting was focused on Agenda Item I.2.b (Supplemental Ecosystem Workgroup Report). We appreciate the Council's consideration of these comments.

The CPSAS has considered at length how to address currently unfished and unmanaged forage stocks, and has reviewed numerous items over time regarding unmanaged "forage" species. We call the Council's attention to our earlier statements (the most recent at Agenda Item G.1.b., Supplemental CPSAS Report, June 2012). The CPSAS acknowledges the importance of conserving forage species due to their contribution to ecosystem function. We support requiring scientific evaluation before allowing development of commercial fishing for unmanaged stocks.

In June 2013, the Council dissolved the Ecosystem Plan Development Team (EPDT) and formed the Ecosystem Workgroup as an ad hoc committee to develop recommendations on the federal list of fisheries and develop the Fisheries Ecosystem Plan (FEP) Initiative 1. The Council requested that the Workgroup define a list of unmanaged forage species, building on Appendix A of the FEP. Further study into food habits of Council-managed species and bycatch of forage species in Council-managed fisheries is essential to better understand how this action could affect fisheries, communities and the marine ecosystem. It is worth noting that CPS advisory bodies previously reviewed the list of unmanaged forage species in Appendix A of the FEP (November 2011 Briefing Book Agenda Item H.2.a, Attachment 1). None of the unmanaged species listed in Appendix A are part of any current CPS fishery.

Regarding Agenda Item I.2.b, the Ecosystem Workgroup Report on the Unmanaged Forage Fish Protection Initiative, the CPSAS would appreciate the Council's consideration of the following recommendations:

1. Initiate a participatory process to refine this list of unmanaged forage fish

The CPSAS agrees with a Workgroup request for additional clarification on the scope of forage species to be considered in this initiative. As such, we support the process of scientific review proposed by the Ecosystem Workgroup and encourage further council discussion and guidance on the definition of "forage fish". As recommended by the Ecosystem Workgroup, the CPSAS also supports clarifying the definition of "unmanaged" as it pertains to this initiative.

2. Include a representative from the relevant advisory bodies to participate in the FEP Initiative 1 process. The Ecosystem Workgroup is requesting a mechanism for bringing needed scientific expertise into this process. The CPSAS strongly supports this request,

including both adding persons with scientific expertise to the Workgroup AND arranging a workshop, as described in the Workgroup report (page 4, bullet 2).

As noted on page 8 of the Workgroup report, "amendments to one of more FMPs will necessarily require tight coordination with other Council Advisory bodies." The CPSAS therefore recommends including formal representation from the CPSAS, CPSMT, as well as other advisory bodies, as appropriate in the Initiative 1 process. Advisory representation in this process will allow for more timely input and review of proposed changes, especially if the meeting schedules for the advisory bodies and workgroup do not align.

3. **Proposed Process and Timeline.** The Ecosystem Workgroup Report (page 3) noted that in light of the Council's potential action under Agenda Item I.1, to adopt an updated List of Fisheries, it is "highly unlikely that new fisheries for forage species could begin without prior Council authorization". This finding echoes earlier comments from industry, and provides time for the Council to conduct a thorough and step-wise process. The CPSAS therefore supports the general process proposed, with timing of the workshop and completion of proposed work determining the schedule of future Council meetings.

COASTAL PELAGIC SPECIES MANAGEMENT TEAM REPORT ON UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

The Coastal Pelagic Management Team (CPSMT) reviewed the Ecosystem Workgroup (Workgroup) supplemental report (Agenda Item I.2.b) and offers these comments for the Council's consideration.

The CPSMT notes that the Workgroup proposes a purpose and need statement for Council review and comment. This initial draft of the purpose and need statement focuses on prohibiting new directed fishing on currently unmanaged and unfished forage fish species in the U.S. West Coast Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ), absent the opportunity for scientific evaluation. The CPSMT supports this draft statement as it frames the issue consistent with the Council's interest in managing forage fish relative to fishing.

The CPSMT agrees with the need to further refine the list of forage fish to be included in Fisheries Ecosystem Plan (FEP) Initiative 1. As the Workgroup report points out, the list was a preliminary effort to identify key species for potential inclusion in Council fishery management plans (FMPs). The Workgroup asks whether the list of forage fish might be expanded to include a broader representation of forage fish species (other than pelagic); and whether the purpose of the action is only to provide an opportunity to review forage fish species as potential new fisheries or to also provide protection to forage fish species not likely to support fisheries but that are important to the greater marine ecosystem as prey to non-FMP species. For action under Initiative 1, the CPSMT recommends the list focus on pelagic, schooling forage fish (i.e. Smith et al. 2011) with connections to one or more FMP species or that are prey to non-FMP EEZ species to address broader ecosystem needs.

The Workgroup requests help from the Council in defining "unmanaged" and "unfished." At present, it is not clear whether the term "unmanaged" should be applied to forage fish species that are caught but not subject to state fishery regulations or whether the term applies if a species is regulated under one or two state's fisheries programs but not all three. The Workgroup intends a thorough review of state policies. For this review, the CPSMT suggests that forage fish species be considered unmanaged if not already subject to regulations by states or tribes as a "working" definition. Similarly, the CPSMT suggests that the term "unfished" should include those species that might be reasonably expected to be taken in a fishery either as target or non-target stocks which are not currently encountered.

Finally, the Workgroup highlighted the need for additional expertise and close coordination with advisory bodies as it proceeds with "next steps." If the Council chooses to use a workshop process to further develop the list of forage fish species, the CPSMT requests that workshop participants include representation by advisory members not already members of the Ecosystem workgroup.

ECOSYSTEM ADVISORY SUBPANEL REPORT ON UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

The Ecosystem Advisory Subpanel (EAS) reviewed and discussed the Fishery Ecosystem Plan (FEP) Initiative 1 and the Supplemental Ecosystem Workgroup (EW) Report (Agenda Item I.2.b). In general, we are suggesting the Council pursue implementation of Initiative 1 in a targeted way so that currently identified species can be protected while unresolved complexities are addressed over time. In this context, the EAS offers the following recommendations.

Adopt a Statement of Purpose and Need

The EAS reviewed the proposed purpose and need statement in the Supplemental Ecosystem Workgroup Report and recommends modifications to improve clarity while maintaining the Pacific Fishery Management Council's intent:

The purpose of this action is to recognize the importance of forage fish species to the marine ecosystem off the U.S. West Coast. This action is intended to meet the needed to provide protection for unmanaged, unfished forage species that are not currently managed by the Council, or the States fish of the U.S. West Coast EEZ by prohibiting new directed fishing on those species until the Council has had an adequate opportunity to assess the scientific information relating to any proposed fishery and to consider potential impacts to existing fisheries, fishing communities, and the greater marine ecosystem.

Identify the Species to be Protected

The EAS recommends that the Council identify species to be protected under FEP Initiative 1. A list has already been compiled (FEP, Appendix A, Table A.2 and attached), consisting of species whose roles in the ecosystem and management status have already been assessed. The Council could proceed with Initiative 1 by focusing on those species in Table A.2 whose management status is listed as "none" or "ESA." This would provide an efficient approach to advance Initiative 1 without precluding changes to the list of protected forage species.

Resolve Ambiguous Terms

The EAS is hopeful that focusing on the species in Table A.2 will allow the Council to proceed with implementing Initiative 1 without first resolving all of the ambiguities raised by the Supplemental EW Report.

Nonetheless, the Supplemental EW Report raises a number of concerns about definitions of "unfished," and "unmanaged." Clarifying these definitions will help determine whether modifications to Table A.2 are required to protect forage species as intended by Initiative 1.

In addition, the EAS recommends that the Council review the definition of forage species derived from Smith et al. (2011) to ensure that it meets the intent and need of Initiative 1. For example, the Council may wish to expand the definition beyond planktivorous fish (e.g. small fish-eating squid).

ECOSYSTEM WORKGROUP REPORT ON UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

A. Introduction

Upon adopting its Fishery Ecosystem Plan (FEP) and FEP appendix in April 2013, the Council decided to immediately begin work on FEP Initiative 1 to implement the Council's policy on protection for unfished forage fish species. The Council discussed its motivations for pursuing this initiative at its June 2012, April 2013, and June 2013 meetings. Based particularly on the Council's June 2012 discussions, the FEP appendix describes the objectives of FEP Initiative 1 as:

"FEP Initiative 1 is intended to recognize the importance of forage fish to the marine ecosystem off the U.S. West Coast, and to provide adequate protection for forage fish. The Council's objective is to prohibit the development of new directed fisheries on forage species that are not currently managed by the Council, or the States, until the Council has had an adequate opportunity to assess the science relating to any proposed fishery and any potential impacts to our existing fisheries and communities. The Council is not pursuing a permanent moratorium on fishing for forage fish. Instead, the Council stated that the proposed goal is to not allow new fisheries to begin without adequate opportunity for assessing the science and the potential impacts on existing fisheries and fishing communities. Under the current rules, there is some risk that fisheries could develop before such analysis could be conducted."

At its April 2013 meeting, the Council outlined work for an ad hoc committee to develop recommendations on revising the federal list of authorized fisheries and gear (see agenda item I.1.) and to begin developing FEP Initiative 1 to "incorporate any additional needed protections [for lower trophic level species] into the current suite of FMPs through an FMP amendment process" (Final Council action at G.1.d, June 2012, see also FEP appendix at A.1.2.2). The Council's April 2013 motion asked that the ad hoc committee address questions in the FEP appendix intended to better define the potential list of species or species groups that could be subject to new protections under FEP Initiative 1:

- 1. Does the species meet the definition for lower trophic level species: often present in high abundance, forming dense aggregations, and which are generally plankton feeders for a large portion of their life cycle (adapted from Smith et al. 2011)?
- 2. Does it occur within the U.S. West Coast EEZ? (Meaning, could it be considered under federal jurisdiction, or does it primarily occur within state waters?)
- 3. Is it managed within a Council FMP or state management program?
- 4. Is the species or species group: taxonomically similar to species within any FMP, the prey of any FMP species or species group, or bycatch within an FMP fishery?

The Council also asked that the ad hoc committee use the appendix's preliminary summary of select lower trophic level CCE species as an initial starting point to address the above four questions and to:

- A. Build on the assessment, started by the Ecosystem Plan Development Team (EPDT), of the likelihood of fisheries developing to harvest those unmanaged species on the preliminary list—for example, consider whether these species are harvested elsewhere or whether markets exist for them;
- B. Brainstorm on whether there are general gear restrictions or prohibitions that could be used to restrict harvest of these unmanaged species;
- C. Develop recommendations for a proposed Council process for moving forward with Initiative 1 and identify next steps; and
- D. Report back to the Council later this year with a more definitive timeline to be discussed under future Council agenda planning and workload.

In June 2013, the Council dissolved the EPDT and formed the Ecosystem Workgroup as an ad hoc committee to develop FEP Initiative 1. The Workgroup first met on August 29, 2013, via conference call. With the short timeframe between the Workgroup's meeting and this September Council meeting, this report focuses on questions C. and D., above, and provides questions for Council consideration that will help the Workgroup to better develop materials for future Council meetings. Question B. will be addressed in part by Council action under Agenda Item I.1., which could remove the gear types commonly used to target schooling lower trophic level species from the list of gears available to non-FMP commercial fisheries.

B. FEP Initiative Draft Statement of Purpose and Need

The Council typically begins consideration of new issues with a discussion of the purpose of and need for action. The objectives of FEP Initiative 1, drawn from the Council's June 2012 discussions on developing new protections for lower trophic level species of the California Current Ecosystem (CCE) can be re-framed as a draft statement of purpose and need for the Council's review and consideration:

The purpose of this action is to recognize the importance of forage fish to the marine ecosystem off the U.S. West Coast. This action is needed to provide protection for unmanaged, unfished forage fish of the U.S. West Coast EEZ by prohibiting new directed fishing on those species until the Council has had an adequate opportunity to assess the scientific information relating to any proposed fishery and to consider potential impacts to existing fisheries, fishing communities, and the greater marine ecosystem.

Throughout its discussions on this issue, the Council has been focused on the question of how to provide new management measures, as needed, for lower trophic level species that are <u>not now managed</u> under its FMPs or under state or tribal management programs. In its November 2011 report, the EPDT noted "that the greatest proportion of energy flow in the CCE [California Current Ecosystem] appears to be through krill, market squid, northern anchovy, Pacific sardine and Pacific herring. There are few other species (excluding juveniles of non-lower trophic level species) that occur with high frequency and with a comparable significance to that core group of species. Thus, despite real or potential historical or future conservation problems for some of these species, there is not a high level of unmanaged standing biomass for forage species that

could become subject to fisheries targeting over the short term and which are critical to large scale CCE functioning, energy flow, or integrity."

The federal list of authorized fisheries and gear, addressed under Agenda Item I.1 of this meeting and Agenda Item H.1 of the Council's June 2013 meeting, requires that persons wishing to develop new fisheries consult with the Council, so that the Council has an opportunity to comment on, develop a regulatory plan for, or recommend that NMFS prohibit the proposed fishery as appropriate. The absence of a particular fishery from that list does not mean that starting such a fishery is prohibited. However, the Council's potential action under I.1 at this meeting to update and tighten the list of authorized fisheries and gear, including the removal of seine, trawl, and other net gears from the categories of gears generally available for use in non-FMP commercial fisheries, and the removal of Pacific saury from the list of commercially fished species, would make it highly unlikely that new fisheries for forage fish species could begin in the U.S. West Coast EEZ without prior Council authorization. The small size and schooling habits of forage fish species makes them most effectively caught with trawl, seine and other net gears.

As the EPDT has stated several times in the past, revising and updating the federal list of authorized fisheries and gear ensures that the Council will be notified if a new fishery begins, but does not prohibit such fisheries from occurring without Council consultation. If the Council wishes to prohibit "new directed fishing on those species until the Council has had an adequate opportunity to assess the scientific information relating to any proposed fishery and to consider potential impacts to existing fisheries, fishing communities, and the greater marine ecosystem," those species must be managed under the authority of an FMP or FMPs.

C. Defining Unmanaged and Unfished Forage Fish Species Under Potential Council Authority

Council questions 1-4 on page 1 of this report, originally from the FEP's appendix, help frame the list of species that could be the subject of this action. Question 1 asks about species that meet the Council's definition of "forage fish" species, which is based on a Smith et al. (2011) paper on lower trophic level species: *species that are often present in high abundance, forming dense schools or aggregations, and which are generally plankton feeders for a large part of their life cycle*. Question 2 looks at the degree to which species occur within the U.S. West Coast EEZ and at whether they might be subject to federal jurisdiction.

In a November 2011 report, the EPDT provided a preliminary list of some managed and unmanaged West Coast EEZ species that could fall under the above definition of "forage fish." At the time, the EPDT noted that the list should be considered incomplete, particularly because it included only pelagic species, and that the EPDT had not had time to complete a review of food habits studies during the preparation of that list. In its April 2013 motion on FEP Initiative 1, the Council identified that list as an initial starting point for launching the initiative, noting that additional review would be needed to move forward in any management process. Characterizing the place of unmanaged and unfished lower trophic level species in the food habits of Councilmanaged species and looking at the bycatch of lower trophic level species in Council-managed fisheries are essential to better understanding how this action could affect species taken in existing fisheries, fishing communities, and the greater marine ecosystem. The Workgroup does not have members with expertise in these areas; therefore, the Workgroup requests that the Council consider a mechanism for bringing needed scientific expertise into the FEP Initiative 1 process, such as by:

- Adding Workgroup positions for scientists with the appropriate expertise from NMFS's Northwest and Southwest Fisheries Science Centers, or;
- Arranging a workshop to review the food habits of Council-managed species, with a
 focus on which species meeting the definition of "forage fish" are the prey of Councilmanaged species, and on which lower trophic level CCE species are taken as bycatch in
 Council-managed fisheries, or;
- Asking that the Scientific and Statistical Committee's Ecosystem Based Management Subcommittee serve as a discussant committee to identify forage fish species with trophic interactions with Council-managed species or with gear interactions with Council-managed fisheries.

The purpose of this scientific review would be to help the Workgroup make recommendations to the Council on: 1) which EEZ species meet the definition of "forage fish" species; and 2) of those species, which have some connection to one or more FMP species – either as prey of an FMP species, as being taxonomically similar to an FMP species, or as bycatch in an FMP fishery. The Workgroup would also appreciate Council guidance on whether this action should address lower trophic level species that may not have any direct connection to FMP species. For example, are there lower trophic level species that are the prey of seabirds, but which are not also preyed upon by FMP species? If so, are those lower trophic level species of interest to the Council under this action? The Council may also wish to have more scientific discussion on its definition of "forage fish." For example, are there lower trophic level species that serve as prey for FMP species, but which do not form "dense schools or aggregations"? If so, are those species of interest to the Council under this action?

The Workgroup is not suggesting that new food habits studies need to be conducted in support this initiative. However, we do need advice from scientists with appropriate expertise to better understand which of the existing food habits studies and other scientific information are most useful for this action. Should the Council wish to add forage fish species to one or more of its FMPs as fishery management unit species (FMU), discussed in more detail in Section D of this report, additional scientific expertise will also be needed to develop harvest reference points and essential fish habitat (EFH) recommendations for the candidate FMU species. The Workgroup also notes that its membership does not include any economists, whose expertise could be useful to addressing the Council's Question A on page 2 of this report, which asks about markets for forage fish species.

The Council may also wish to consider framing FEP Initiative 1 by commenting on how it would define "unmanaged" and "unfished" species. The FEP Appendix at section A.1.2.2 states "If a species is already within an FMP, or under the jurisdiction of a state management program of Washington, Oregon, or California, that species would not be subject to this initiative." In the November 2011 EPDT report mentioned above, the EPDT's preliminary list of managed and unmanaged forage fish species also included species listed under the ESA, such as Eulachon, as federally-managed species. Some of the species in that table, such as Osmerid smelts, may be inappropriately identified as "unmanaged" if they do not fall within state management programs for all three states. Council guidance on how to identify which species are "unmanaged" would be helpful, particularly addressing these questions:

• What does "subject to a state management program" mean? Must the species in question be either taken in a state-managed fishery, or be subject to fishery prohibitions to be considered "managed" by the state?

• If a species is found within the EEZ and is subject to a state management program in one or two states, but not all three, should it be considered for inclusion in this action?

The Workgroup plans to describe state policies on forage fish and discuss how those may interact with each other and with federal management programs in future Workgroup reports to the Council.

While defining the term "unfished" may seem unnecessary, it may be useful to ensure that the Council shares an understanding of what is meant by "unfished," in order to identify the species that could be the subject of this action. Under the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act (MSA), the term "fishing" means: "(A) the catching, taking, or harvesting of fish; (B) the attempted catching, taking, or harvesting of fish; (C) any other activity which can be reasonably expected to result in the catching, taking, or harvesting of fish; or (D) any operations at sea in support of, or in preparation for, any activity described in subparagraphs (A) through (C)." Using this definition, the species that could be considered "unfished" for the purposes of this action could be those that are either not encountered in any fishery (not caught, taken, or harvested) or those that may be encountered as bycatch in a fishery, but which are not retained for sale or sold.

D. Process Considerations for Adding Unmanaged Species to FMPs

If species are to be added to one or more FMPs, they would be added as either FMU species or as ecosystem component (EC) species. Federal regulations at 50 CFR 600.10 define the term "fishery management unit" to mean: "a fishery or that portion of a fishery identified in an FMP relevant to the FMP's management objectives. The choice of an FMU depends on the focus of the FMP's objectives, and may be organized around biological, geographic, economic, technical, social, or ecological perspectives." Fish stocks that are classified as FMU species are considered to be in the fishery, whether as target or non-target species. The National Standard Guidelines at 50 CFR 600.310(d)(3) and (4) provide the following definitions for "target stocks" and "non-target species," both of which are considered FMU species:

"Target stocks" are stocks that fishers seek to catch for sale or personal use, including "economic discards" as defined under the MSA at section 3(9).

"Non-target species" and "non-target stocks" are fish caught incidentally during the pursuit of target stocks in a fishery, including "regulatory discards" as defined under the MSA at section 3(38). They may or may not be retained for sale or personal use. Non-target species may be included in a fishery and, if so, they should be identified at the stock level. Some non-target species may be identified in an FMP as ecosystem component (EC) species or stocks.

At 50 CFR 600.310(d)(5), federal regulations provide details on classifying species as EC species, saying that those species should:

- (A) Be a non-target species or non-target stock;
- (B) Not be determined to be subject to overfishing, approaching overfished, or overfished;
- (C) Not likely to become subject to overfishing or overfished, according to the best available information, in the absence of conservation and management measures; and

(D) Not generally be retained for sale or personal use.

Those same regulations provide further guidance, stating "Occasional retention of [a] species would not, in and of itself, preclude consideration of the species under the EC classification . . . EC species may be identified at the species or stock level, and may be grouped into complexes. EC species may, but are not required to, be included in an FMP or FMP amendment for any of the following reasons: For data collection purposes; for ecosystem considerations related to specification of OY for the associated fishery; as considerations in the development of conservation and management measures for the associated fishery; and/or to address other ecosystem issues. While EC species are not considered to be 'in the fishery,' a Council should consider measures for the fishery to minimize bycatch and bycatch mortality of EC species consistent with National Standard 9, and to protect their associated role in the ecosystem. EC species do not require specification of reference points but should be monitored to the extent that any new pertinent scientific information becomes available (e.g., catch trends, vulnerability, etc.) to determine changes in their status or their vulnerability to the fishery. If necessary, they should be reclassified as 'in the fishery'."

The North Pacific Fishery Management Council (NPFMC) has a potentially useful example of adding large groups of lower trophic level species, characterized at the family or genus taxonomic order, to FMPs in order to prohibit the development of fisheries for those species. In 1998, the NPFMC first defined forage fish species categories within Amendment 36 to its FMP for Groundfish of the Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands and Amendment 39 to its FMP for Groundfish of the Gulf of Alaska. The NPFMC chose its groups of forage fish species based on data from the groundfish trawl fisheries, where lower trophic level species were occurring as minimal bycatch. The FMPs prohibited directed fishing for the forage species categories and restricted the fisheries to minimal levels of bycatch for these species.

The NPFMC Groundfish FMPs were updated via more recent amendments to comply with new requirements to establish annual catch limits and comply with National Standard 1 guidelines (Amendments 95 and 96 for the Bering Sea and Aleutian Islands, and Amendment 87 for the Gulf of Alaska FMPs). The FMPs now separate the "species or species groups [that] are likely to be taken in the groundfish fishery" into three categories: target species, prohibited species, and forage fish species, with the latter two categories together representing the EC species of the FMPs. For illustration purposes, a portion of Section 3.1.2 of the Gulf of Alaska Groundfish FMP (NPFMC 2011) is excerpted here:

1. In the Fishery:

a) <u>Target species</u> — are those species that support a single species or mixed species target fishery, are commercially important, and for which a sufficient data base exists that allows each to be managed on its own biological merits. Accordingly, a specific total allowable catch (TAC) is established annually for each target species or species assemblage. Catch of each species must be recorded and reported. This category includes walleye pollock, Pacific cod, sablefish, shallow and deep water flatfish, rex sole, flathead sole, arrowtooth flounder, Pacific ocean perch, shortraker/rougheye rockfish, northern rockfish, "other slope" rockfish, pelagic shelf rockfish, demersal shelf rockfish, thornyhead rockfish, Atka mackerel, squid, sculpin, sharks, octopus, and skates.

2. Ecosystem Component:

a) <u>Prohibited Species</u> – are those species and species groups the catch of which must be avoided while fishing for groundfish, and which must be immediately returned to sea with a minimum of injury except when their retention is authorized by other applicable law (see also Prohibited Species Donation Program described in Section 3.6.1.1. Groundfish

species and species groups under the FMP for which the quotas have been achieved shall be treated in the same manner as prohibited species.

b) <u>Forage fish species</u> – are those species listed in Table 3-1, which are a critical food source for many marine mammal, seabird and fish species. The forage fish species category is established to allow for the management of these species in a manner that prevents the development of a commercial directed fishery for forage fish. Management measures for this species category will be specified in regulations and may include such measures as prohibitions on directed fishing, limitations on allowable bycatch retention amounts, or limitations on the sale, barter, trade or any other commercial exchange, as well as the processing of forage fish in a commercial processing facility.

The species within both of the NPFMC Groundfish FMPs' forage fish species categories are:

Osmeridae family (eulachon, capelin, and other smelts)

Myctophidae family (lanternfishes)

Bathylagidae family (deep-sea smelts)

Ammodytidae family (Pacific sand lance)

Trichodontidae family (Pacific sand fish)

Pholidae family (gunnels)

Stichaeidae family (pricklebacks, warbonnets, eelblennys, cockscombs, and shannys)

Gonostomatidae family (bristlemouths, lightfishes, and anglemouths)

Order Euphausiacea (krill)

The NPFMC does not establish annual harvest limits for its forage fish species, and both FMPs state that there is insufficient information to provide EFH descriptions for forage fish species. Under federal regulations at 50 CFR 679.20(i)(3): "directed fishing for forage fish is prohibited within the Bering Sea, Aleutian Islands, and Gulf of Alaska; the sale, barter, trade, or processing of forage fish is prohibited except as fishmeal; and, retained catch of forage fish not exceeding maximum retainable bycatch amounts set in Federal regulations at 50 CFR 679, Table 10 may be processed into fishmeal for sale, barter, or trade." NMFS's Alaska Fisheries Science Center reports on the life histories of and data available on the FMP forage fish species, but does not have adequate data to conduct stock assessments for these species groups (Ormseth et al. 2008, Ormseth 2011).

In a June 2012 report (see Agenda Item G.1.b), the EPDT described two options for adding forage fish species to one or more FMPs, as either FMU or EC species. Regardless of whether those species would be added as FMU or EC species or some mix thereof, the implementation process would occur approximately as follows:

1st Council meeting (September 2013): review a draft process and schedule for FMP amendment(s) to add new species to applicable FMP(s) and provide guidance to the Ecosystem Workgroup on future reports to the Council.

2nd Council meeting: review list of potential species to be added to FMP(s), review ecological, biological, economic and other data on the role of species as forage and potential for the development of fisheries on those species, adopt process and schedule for potential draft FMP amendment(s). Review availability of scientific data and analyses needed to develop MSA-required harvest reference points for the new species

3rd Council meeting: Review recommendations of SSC and other advisory bodies on list of species to be added to the FMP(s) and MSA-required harvest reference

points and EFH designations. Develop draft FMP amendatory language to be sent out for public review.

4th Council meeting: Review and either adopt FMP amendatory language (which would include MSA-required harvest reference points and EFH designations,) or revise and send language out for an additional round of review and comment by advisory bodies and the public. If an additional round of review and comment is needed, a 5th Council meeting will be needed to finalize Council recommendations to NMFS.

1st Federal Register Notice: NMFS publishes a Notice of Availability for an FMP amendment for the appropriate FMP(s).

2nd Federal Register Notice: NMFS publishes Council recommendations as proposed rule.

3rd Federal Register Notice: NMFS will publish a final rule if it partially or fully approves the Council's recommendations to amend the FMP(s) and Federal regulations.

This process assumes that the Ecosystem Workgroup will take on the bulk of the workload associated with developing FMP amendments. The Workgroup notes, however, that amendments to one or more FMPs will necessarily require tight coordination with other Council advisory bodies and ample review time for those advisory bodies to consider potential changes to their FMPs. When considering scheduling this issue for further discussion at its future meetings, the Council may wish to take into account the meeting schedules of the Council's various advisory bodies and the adequacy of opportunities for those bodies to comment on actions that may affect the FMPs they administer on behalf of the Council.

E. Next Steps

If the Council wishes to proceed with FEP Initiative 1 through amendments to one or more of FMPs to add new lower trophic level species to those FMPs, the Ecosystem Workgroup suggests that the Council:

- Review and comment on the draft Purpose and Need statement in Section B of this report.
- Discuss a method for bringing persons with expertise in CCE ecology, the food habits of CCE species, and bycatch in FMP fisheries into the FEP Initiative 1 development process.
- Assign the appropriate advisory bodies or workshop process to draft a list of lower trophic level species that: 1) are found within the EEZ and which meet the definition of "forage fish" species, 2) have some connection to one or more FMP species, either as prey of an FMP species, as being taxonomically similar to an FMP species, or as bycatch in an FMP fishery. The Council may also wish to consider lower trophic level species that serve as forage for non-FMP CCE species. If appropriate, this list should identify these lower trophic level species at the family or genus level.
- Discuss its preferences for whether and how lower trophic level species should be characterized as "managed" or "unmanaged," and discuss whether it has changes to the Workgroup's MSA-derived discussion of the term "unfished" see page 4 of this report.

- Assign the Workgroup to describe potential alternatives for amending the FMPs to include forage species management: forage species are incorporated into one FMP as FMU or EC species, or some mix of FMU and EC species, as appropriate; forage species are incorporated into multiple FMPs as FMU or EC species, or some mix of FMU and EC species, as appropriate.
- Schedule the Ecosystem Workgroup to report back to the Council in Spring 2014, as appropriate to the Council's schedule, and taking into account the need for review and comment from multiple advisory bodies across the FMPs.

GROUNDFISH ADVISORY SUBPANEL REPORT ON THE UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

The Groundfish Advisory Subpanel (GAP) received a report from Mr. Mike Burner and reviewed information on the unmanaged forage fish initiative.

The GAP has generally supported the ecosystem process and development of a fishery ecosystem plan (FEP) as strictly an advisory plan. GAP members generally agree the Ad Hoc Ecosystem Workgroup (EWG) has done a commendable job of gathering information on proposed forage fish definitions and processes for identification. Further, we understand the EWG will continue this process.

Some of the GAP discussion included questions about the exact definition of a forage fish species. At what trophic level -- it seems fish at every level could be considered forage fish for those at higher trophic levels – would forage fish be listed? What exactly are the characteristics? The EWG has a good start on answering some of these questions.

Further, the GAP agrees that identifying management regimes for any potential forage fish species is important. Duplicating management systems already in place by other entities could waste valuable Council resources.

HABITAT COMMITTEE REPORT ON UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

The Habitat Committee (HC) reviewed information on the unmanaged forage fish initiative. This topic has generated high and diverse amounts of public comment in support of the initiative, and the HC would like to see this topic pursued on an aggressive timeline. HC supports the next steps in Section E of the I.2.b supplemental report, with the following clarifications:

- The HC recommends that the initiative be continued by the Ecosystem Workgroup, which should include at least one scientist with expertise in forage fish communities and trophic ecology.
- The HC recommends development of a workshop that allows the Ecosystem Workgroup to obtain information on relevant species and data gaps.
- The HC endorses the process that starts with identifying lower-trophic level species, highlights those of concern, examines present management regimes, and subsequently devises a management approach that fits the problem.

SALMON ADVISORY SUBPANEL REPORT ON UNMANAGED FORAGE FISH PROTECTION INITIATIVE

The Salmon Advisory Subpanel (SAS) met via teleconference on September 3, 2013 and discussed Initiative 1 of the Fishery Ecosystem Plan regarding unmanaged forage species. The SAS remains supportive of protective measures for unmanaged forage species, but not a permanent moratorium on fishing for forage fish. The SAS agrees that new directed fisheries on forage species should not be allowed to proceed until the Council has had time to assess the science relating to any proposed fishery and any potential impacts to existing fisheries and communities.

I am an avid sport fisherman running out of Winchester Bay for Salmon, Albacore, Halibut and Lingcod. Over the last few years I have become concerned about the lack of Herring, Anchovies and Sardines in the area I fish. These forage fish have in years past run into Winchester Bay, where they have been netted and sold as fresh bait, that hasn't happened now for three years. This year there has been a tremendous Chinook Salmon fishery right outside Winchester Bay. The bait that I see in the bills of birds and in the stomachs of Salmon appear to be Pacific Sand Lance. Locals call them "Candlefish". The salmon and birds are gorging themselves on Sand Lance, however there is no indication that there is any other forage fish present. I may not see the whole picture, but I am concerned. In past years, I've seen various forage fish in salmon bellies at various times of the official fishing season, not this year. My fear is that the forage fish that salmon and other fish rely on are being over harvested by humans or that the warming climate may have a detrimental affect.

The top priority for the Council should be to protect the food web that supports a healthy ecosystem and all the benefits we derive from it. Bringing key unmanaged forage species under the council's authority will fulfill the commitment the Council made a year ago to prohibit new fisheries on forage species until evaluating how removing prey would impact existing fisheries, fishing communities, and the broader ecosystem. Asking important questions before fishing begins, rather than after, makes sense, especially as worldwide demand on our oceans grows more intense.

I have been involved in ocean conservation issues for over 30 years, and am heartened to see decision makers here on the West Coast show the leadership necessary to move our fishery management system towards an ecosystem---based approach. I write today on behalf of the International Game Fish Association (IGFA) and our 12,000 members in 135 countries who share in the benefit of productive marine ecosystems around the world. The Pacific council has already shown leadership in marine conservation by adopting an ecosystem plan that prioritizes protection of forage fish as the key link in a healthy ocean food web along the Pacific coast. Now I encourage you to give that plan meaning by voting in September to extend basic management protection to forage fish species that aren't yet being targeted.

The IGFA is a not-for-profit organization committed to the conservation of game fish and the promotion of responsible, ethical angling practices through science, education, rule making and record keeping. Our members are dedicated anglers who know that the future of our sport – and the economic activity it generates – depends on responsible practices today.

The council would be wise to bring currently unmanaged forage species such as Pacific saury, sand lance and smelts into appropriate fishery management plans as soon as possible. We appreciate that the council recommended interim protection of Pacific saury with its decision in June to revise the current List of Authorized Fisheries and Gear. Now is the time for the council to establish long-term protection for saury and other currently unmanaged forage species. Bringing them into existing fishery management plans enables the council to establish conservation and management measures to protect these species from unregulated fishing.

It's important to get the process started as soon as possible. We know that global demand is rising to pull forage fish out of productive marine ecosystems and turn it into high-volume products such as bait for industrial tuna longline fishing or food to fatten pen-raised tuna. The council's ecosystem plan development team cited the "spectacular growth" of the global aquaculture industry as raising the likelihood for industrial-scale fishing to expand to forage species that aren't yet being targeted on the West Coast. Putting management measures in place before fishing begins makes sense, especially as worldwide demand on our oceans grows more intense.

Thank you for your attention to this issue and for your commitment to a healthy and productive Pacific marine ecosystem.

I am writing on behalf of Fishermen's Spot, a full service fly fishing shop that has been helping anglers in the Greater Los Angeles area for over 43 years. I have enjoyed salt water fly fishing for many years, and therefore have a unique perspective on the importance of a balanced marine ecosystem, and the role that forage fish play. As co-owner of a business that depends on a healthy and productive Pacific Ocean, I ask the Council to establish meaningful protections for forage fish that form the foundation of a vibrant marine food web, allowing businesses to thrive on the support of a healthy ocean.

I encourage you to move ahead with the first concrete "ecosystem initiative" under your new Fishery Ecosystem Plan -- to protect those forage fish that under the *status quo* are vulnerable to unregulated fisheries. Enacting this initiative will fulfill the intent of the Council to prohibit new fisheries targeting forage fish until the science is in place to determine the effect on existing fisheries and coastal communities. As the global demand for forage fish rises, this is the time to enact a precautionary policy that will give business owners peace of mind that a critical component of the natural resource that we rely upon is protected.

Fishmeal and fish oil prices have risen substantially in the past year, raising the incentive for new large-scale fisheries targeting West Coast species of forage fish such as sand lance, saury and certain kinds of smelts. Dear Ms. Lowman and Council members:

Oceana commends the Pacific Fishery Management Council, the Ecosystem Plan Development Team, and Ecosystem Advisory Subpanel for the hard work and dedication to developing the first ever Fishery Ecosystem Plan (FEP) for the California Current marine ecosystem. The FEP describes a vision for how to successfully manage for sustainable and valuable West Coast fisheries while maintaining the health of the ocean ecosystem. We are also pleased with the formation of the ad-hoc committee to carry out the parameters of the FEP. The first FEP initiative is to protect currently unmanaged forage species. Oceana strongly supports initiating a regulatory amendment process at the Council's September 2013 meeting to prohibit fishing for all currently unmanaged forage fish.

The Council's action to adopt the FEP at the April 2013 meeting reflected a much needed shift from maximizing the catch of single species to a more holistic approach that strives for both sustainability and a diverse, productive Pacific Ocean environment. The FEP forage initiative will set a new precautionary course for preventing the development of new fisheries on currently unfished forage species unless and until adequate science can demonstrate that these fisheries may be conducted without causing harm to the ocean predators reliant on these small, but essential fish.

As your Ecosystem Plan Development Team has emphasized, global finfish and shrimp aquaculture are increasing faster than any other food sector, and this industry is dependent on feeds derived from wild-caught forage fish (i.e., lower trophic level species). As stated in the November 2011 PFMC Draft Ecosystem Plan:

Demand for LTL [lower trophic level] species in the production of fishmeal has mainly been driven by the spectacular growth of global aquaculture, which is expected to continue into the foreseeable future (Tacon and Metian 2008, Shamshak and Anderson 2008, Herrick et al. 2009). The production of many aquaculture species depends on LTL species fisheries to supply the raw ingredients in today's aquafeeds. In the recent boom in capture-based aquaculture, demand has increased for whole live/fresh/frozen LTL species for pen fattening aquaculture operations (Zertuche-Gonzales et al. 2008)... Given limited potential for increased fishmeal production from traditional LTL species,

prices for fishmeal and fish oil will continue to rise (Figure A5). This makes the prospect for fisheries developing on the minor LTL species all that more attractive, as higher fishmeal prices are sure to translate into higher exvessel prices for the raw ingredients.¹

It is only a matter of time before the growing demand for fish meal and fish oil from the rapidly growing global aquaculture industry increases the price of these raw materials, hence making any species from which these products can be extracted economically viable, even if they do not appear viable today. In fact, we are already seeing this play out as the price of fish meal has increased substantially in recent years. Aquaculture's use of forage fish has more than doubled in the last two decades² but the global supply has decreased, largely due to the decline in landings from the Peruvian anchoveta fishery (the main global source of commodity fish meal and fish oil). We are already aware of international efforts to develop fisheries for some of the same forage species that are currently unmanaged off the U.S. West Coast (e.g., myctophids, saury, etc.).

Prohibiting forage fish fisheries from developing before they start is much easier politically and economically than closing fisheries after capital investments are made. Such prohibitions, if properly designed, can also provide clarity to parties interested in potentially developing such fisheries. Yet, like the Council's unanimous action in 2006 to prohibit directed fishing for krill, these precautionary actions are necessary "to maintain the integrity of the ecosystem and to minimize the risk of irreversible adverse impacts on managed fish stocks and other living marine resources..." As such it is our view that no forage species should be excluded from a list of species for which fisheries could potentially develop. We support developing regulatory management measures to protect the unmanaged forage fish identified in Table A-2 of Appendix A to the FEP.⁴

We do have concerns with the FEP Initiative 1 decision process described on page A-7 and A-8 of the FEP initiatives document. Principally this section implies that the Council only has authority over a species if it occurs "exclusively or primarily within the U.S. West Coast EEZ." There is no logical or legal merit for this as the Council and NOAA clearly do have management responsibilities and authority over marine species that migrate into the West Coast EEZ for part of their life history and for species that do not "exclusively" reside in the West Coast EEZ.

Many of the Council's managed highly migratory species do not occur exclusively or primarily within the West Coast EEZ and yet NOAA and the Council still have management responsibilities and authority for them. Other species managed under the coastal pelagic species

plan, groundfish plan and salmon plan also migrate in and out of the West Coast EEZ and some of these are in no way exclusive to or primarily within the EEZ. We see no logical or legal basis for including this specific criterion in the decision tree and we request that it be removed. In fact, this would set a negative precedent for the conservation of species, such as round and thread herrings that are primarily sub-tropical species yet are reasonably abundant off southern California and likely to expand their range due to global climate change. Similarly, Pacific saury which are at times in high abundance off the U.S. West Coast have a trans-Pacific distribution. Regardless of whether such species occur exclusively or primarily within the U.S. West Coast EEZ, they may serve as key forage species for California Current predators, hence it is imperative that the Council include all currently unmanaged forage species in its forage initiative.

In summary, we request that the PFMC initiate an amendment process at this meeting to add currently unmanaged forage species with the expressed intent of prohibiting directed commercial harvest for them into current FMPs. Further, we ask that directed commercial fisheries be prohibited from developing on these species unless and until appropriate management benchmarks are in place that would allow a sustainable fishery to commence without adversely impacting the functional role these species provide as prey to other marine life. We request that a draft analysis and range of alternatives be developed and that the Council take final action on a regulatory FMP amendment in the Spring of 2014.

Thank you for furthering the conservation of forage species and advancing ecosystem-based fishery management. We look forward to continuing to work with you.

To the Pacific Fishery Management Council:

I encourage you to vote in September to bring forage fish species, which are critically important to the ocean ecosystem, under management as soon as possible. Placing currently unmanaged forage fish in appropriate fishery management plans is the simplest way for the council to follow through on the objective it set in 2012 to prohibit new fishing on forage species until it evaluates the effect on the ocean food web.

The council deserves credit for its recent efforts to maintain a healthy ocean, including the unanimous adoption of a fishery ecosystem plan earlier this year. The plan's first concrete initiative calls for protecting unmanaged forage fish. This is a sensible place to start because of the critical ecological role of forage fish as food for bigger fish, marine mammals, and seabirds.

Forage species such as Pacific saury, sand lance, and various kinds of smelt play an important role in ocean health. A productive Pacific marine ecosystem helps to generate \$43 billion per year in ocean-dependent revenue in California alone, according to a study cited in 2006 by the West Coast Governors Alliance on Ocean Health. None of that revenue comes from catching unmanaged forage species, which are not currently being fished. However, the council's analysis notes that commercial interests are likely to pursue West Coast forage species eventually because of the "spectacular growth" of the global aquaculture industry. This high-volume enterprise will take a toll on critical prey fish, and the larger fish and wildlife that depend on them, along the Pacific coast.

Thank you for considering my comments and for your commitment to sustaining a healthy Pacific Ocean as a tremendous natural, economic, and cultural asset for the region and the nation as a whole.

Dear Ms. Lowman and Members of the Pacific Fishery Management Council,

Wild Oceans supports the Pacific Council's decision to protect unmanaged forage species as the first initiative under its newly adopted ecosystem plan and appreciates the opportunity to provide the following comments for consideration at the September meeting.

In April, Ecosystem Initiative 1 began with the formation of an ad-hoc committee tasked with the following directive:

Working from the flow chart on Figure A.1 on page A-8 and Table A.2 on page A-10 of the Ecosystem Initiatives Appendix, the charge of the ad hoc committee would be to use this preliminary summary of select lower trophic level species in the CCE as an initial starting point to address the first four questions, and the following:

- a. Build on the assessment, started by the EPDT, of the likelihood of fisheries developing to harvest those unmanaged species on the preliminary list—for example, consider whether these species are harvested elsewhere or whether markets exist for them; and
- Brainstorm on whether there are general gear restrictions or prohibitions that could be used to restrict harvest of these unmanaged species; and
- c. Develop recommendations for a proposed Council process for moving forward with Initiative 1 and identify next steps.
- d. Ad hoc committee would report back to the Council later this year with a more definitive timeline to be discussed under future Council agenda planning and workload.

Since the above motion was passed in April, the ad-hoc committee has convened only once via a conference call on August $29^{\rm th}$. At the committee's current rate of progress, we are concerned that it will be unable to provide recommendations and a timeline for next steps

Additional direction and resources for the committee's work are needed, and we urge the Council to provide this guidance so that the adhoc committee can tackle its charge more efficiently.

Because the ecosystem plan is not a regulatory document, the only path forward for effectively protecting unmanaged forage species is to incorporate them into one or more existing fishery management plans (FMPs), where conservation measures would be developed into enforceable regulations. In addition, because the goal is to prohibit harvest until there is a plan in place that shows fishing can be conducted without harming the California Current marine ecosystem, placement in an FMP would bring attention to data deficiencies and promote research needs within council priorities. Exploring fishery management plan options, in the form of an amendment to single FMP, separate amendments to multiple FMPs, or an omnibus amendment is the logical path for the ad-hoc committee to pursue going forward.

There are a number of federal management examples, applicable to Ecosystem Initiative 1, for prohibiting harvest on ecologically important forage species, and these examples should be investigated to jumpstart the ad-hoc committee's work. These examples include:

- The Coastal Pelagic Species Fishery Management Plan (CPS FMP), which already contains a prohibited species category for species "in the fishery." The plan establishes an Optimum Yield (OY) of zero for krill species to "ensure that, to the extent practicable, fisheries will not develop that could put at risk krill stocks and the other living marine resources that depend on krill." This same logic would apply to other forage species that range in the EEZ. We note that in 2009, after the issuance of revised National Standard 1 Guidelines that emphasize forage fish conservation, we urged the Council to incorporate all unmanaged forage species into the CPS FMP following the krill example. The main argument in opposition to our recommendation was that these considerations should be addressed through the ecosystem plan, which was just getting underway at the time. Now that the ecosystem plan is complete and the Council has clearly stated its intent in regard to unmanaged forage species, it is appropriate to revisit this recommendation.
- The North Pacific Fishery Management Council's (NPFMC) amendments to the groundfish plans for the Aleutian Islands & Bering Sea (Amendments 36 & 96), and the Gulf of Alaska (Amendments 39 & 87), which created a special forage fish

management category for taxonomic families of lower trophic level species that are important ecologically as prey but for which there is no directed fishing. The forage fish category is restricted as a bycatch only fishery, and the species within the category are categorized as ecosystem component species.

• The NPFMC Arctic Fishery Management Plan, which prohibits commercial fishing on all species, either fishery management unit species or ecosystem component species, until adequate information is available to manage a new fishery sustainably.

In addition to examining fishery management plan options for protecting unmanaged forage species, we feel that it is sensible at this stage for the Council to reconsider two recommendations we made in April for the ad-hoc committee. First, we recommended that ecologists be part of the ad-hoc committee's composition. We understand that resources are limited but stress the importance of ecological expertise in fulfilling the Council's objective for Initiative 1. The first step in the process is to determine what species or species groups should be subject to the new protections, and we are concerned that the decision tree in FEP Appendix A (Figure A.1) is unnecessarily constraining (e.g., requiring that species occur exclusively or primarily in the EEZ). An ecologist's perspective in developing the decision tree and list would be invaluable.

Second, we recommended that the ad-hoc committee begin laying the groundwork for an index of forage base status that would be used to inform future council decision-making. Since the primary task of this new team is creating recommendations for protecting unmanaged forage fish in order to enhance forage availability, the team members' findings could be applied as well to the task of determining how best to monitor, manage and maintain the forage base overall. Because of the multifaceted nature of ecosystem-based management strategies, there will likely be connections between ecosystem initiatives as there are now between Ecosystem Initiative 1 and Ecosystem Initiative 9 (Indicators for Analyses of Council Actions Initiative). When these opportunities arise, it is important for the Council to acknowledge the connections between initiatives so that resources can be used wisely to advance the FEP's objectives.

Enacting this initiative will fulfill the intent of the Council to prohibit new fisheries targeting forage fish until the science is in place to determine the effect on existing fisheries and coastal communities. As the global demand for forage fish rises, this is the time to enact a precautionary policy that will give fishermen and marine resource advocates peace of mind that a critical component of the natural resource that we rely upon is protected.

A productive ecosystem is both a cultural resource for coastal communities as well as an economic engine that generates billions of dollars each year through sustainable fisheries, the consumption of fresh local seafood, whale-watching, birding, recreational fishing and other marine based activities. In California alone, a productive marine food web helps to generate \$43 billion annually in ocean-dependent revenue, according to a study cited in 2006 by the West Coast Governors Alliance on Ocean Health. Dear Chair Lowman and Council Members,

I write to you today as a business owner and citizen who appreciates the work you've done so far to sustain a productive Pacific marine ecosystem. Fourteen years ago, I co-founded Fishpond, inc. in Colorado to design and manufacture high-quality fly fishing and outdoor gear. Like many of Fishpond's customers, I'm passionate about fly-fishing for salmon and steelhead throughout Western rivers. Yet I also know that healthy salmon runs depend to a great degree on conditions they find in the ocean, where the presence of forage fish is critical.

I encourage the council to follow through on the commitment you made a year ago and put in place a management protection plan for forage fish species that aren't yet being targeted on the West Coast.

As we slowly begin to make progress improving freshwater salmon habitat, we have an equal responsibility to do everything we can to maintain their food supply in the ocean. We know that forage fish are an important food source for mature salmon in the ocean, and they're critical as "alternative prey" for young salmon smolts transitioning through predatory seabirds, marine mammals and bigger fish as they leave the river. The council would be wise to put in place a basic management protection plan for forage fish species like smelt, saury and sand lance as soon as possible, before new industrial-scale fisheries begin. Right now, these fish are vulnerable to new fisheries with no catch limits and no protections of any kind. This is intolerable to us as a company that depends on the health of our rivers and ecosystems, and to our retail dealer base that economically depend on having vibrant runs of anadromous fish moving into our freshwater systems from the West Coast.

In deciding whether to protect forage fish now, the council can take a proactive step toward maintaining a productive marine ecosystem. This is not only good for the environment that we all share, but there is also an economic cost to bear if we don't act with foresight. A healthy Pacific marine ecosystem is an economic engine that generates thousands of jobs in the recreational fishing sector along the West Coast and far inland for those who fish for salmon, steelhead trout and sturgeon in freshwater.

Rather than fixing a problem later, the council has an opportunity to be proactive in protecting our nation's investment in salmon and steelhead recovery. I urge you to act.

Dear Chairwoman Lowman and Council Members:

Ocean Conservancy¹ submits the following comments regarding the Pacific Fishery Management Council's consideration of ecosystem-based Initiative #1. We appreciate the Council's efforts in developing a more ecosystem-based approach to fisheries management through the Fishery Ecosystem Plan (FEP) and the Council's preparatory work in crafting protective options for forage species through existing fishery management plan (FMP) authority. We strongly support the Council's formal initiation of an FMP amendment process to protect unmanaged forage species with the goal of helping protect and sustain the marine ecosystem under the Pacific Council's jurisdiction. We look forward to working with Council and the *ad hoc* committee throughout this important process.

Our comments below relate to bringing unmanaged forage species into one or more FMPs, activities assigned by the Council to the *ad hoc* committee in April 2013, and the policy issues associated with the FMP process that will unfold in the next year.

Ensure Council Review and Authorization Prior to Proposed Fishing on Unmanaged Forage Species

The Council has appropriately defined the goal of Initiative #1 as preventing unregulated catch of fish species that form the forage base for the Pacific ecosystem unless and until information is available to support ecologically sustainable management. To bring this goal to fruition within one or more FMPs, we urge the Council to direct the *ad hoc* committee to establish prior Council assessment and authorization requirements and standards for new forage fisheries, accompanied by clear ecosystem-based criteria to

inform these actions. We urge the development of a set of ecosystem-based criteria against which to review scientific information and asses the merits of a proposed fishery prior to it proceeding. So long as prior Council consideration and affirmative action on a proposal to catch unmanaged forage fish is required, the Council will have considerable flexibility in choosing how forage species are classified for FMP purposes and which management measures are selected to achieve the FMP's and Council's goals associated with them. Thus, we urge the Council to direct the *ad hoc* committee to firmly establish prior Council assessment and authorization requirements, and clear ecosystem-based criteria to inform these actions as the basic framework for FMP protections for unmanaged forage species. The Council may then select options with administrative, process and other considerations further refining those choices.

2. Classification of Forage Species and Determination of FMPs to House Forage Protections

Classification of forage species as a species "in the fishery" within Fishery Management Units (FMUs) or, alternatively, as Ecosystem Component (EC) species² outside of FMUs both appear capable of meeting the Council's goal of protection for certain forage species, with varying cost, and administrative and process considerations. Since authority is provided in section 303(b)(12) of the Magnuson-Stevens Act³ to enact measures for the management and conservation of non-target species and habitats, we recommend the Council designate unmanaged, currently non-target forage species as ecosystem component species in appropriate FMP(s) and adopt management measures requiring adequate science and management be in place prior to directed commercial fishing.

The Council has several options in determining which FMP or FMPs would best accommodate unmanaged forage species protections. The Coastal Pelagic Species (CPS) FMP could be selected based on similarity of many forage species to those currently found in the CPS FMP. The Groundfish FMP could be appropriate given the nexus of forage species as prey. An omnibus amendment that brings unmanaged forage species into both the CPS and Groundfish FMPs would provide an opportunity to assign species to FMPs as appropriate based on scientific and other input during the amendment process. Dependent on information the *ad hoc* committee develops during the amendment process, Ocean Conservancy can support this range of options provided that the Council enacts specific management measures that protect forage species from unmanaged fishing.

3. Preliminary List of Forage Species under Initiative #1.

We believe the preliminary list of forage species developed by the Ecosystem Development Plan Team (EDPT) found in the FEP appendix defines the proper array of species that should come under protection through Initiative #1. However, we believe three of the items present in the flow chart that accompany it may inappropriately limit application of FMP protections for forage fish: (1) existing management, (2) exclusive or primary occurrence in the EEZ, and (3) likelihood of fishery development. Instead, we urge the Council to eliminate these limiting factors and offer the entire preliminary list for protection under Initiative #1.

First, the preliminary list forage fish prepared by the EDPT contains language distinguishing "unmanaged" fish from those subject to state or tribal management program. We believe forage species should be eligible for protection under Initiative #1 unless they are currently and actively managed in federal waters. Not only does state or tribal management not necessarily provide protection in federal waters, the protection afforded by such management may not be consistent with the Council's goal with respect of forage protection. We therefore urge Initiative #1 protection be afforded to all defined forage species not actively managed by the Council throughout the Council's jurisdiction.

Ocean Conservancy's second concern regarding the EDPT preliminary list is the language that would eliminate species from consideration for Initiative #1 protection that do not "occur exclusively or primarily within the US West Coast EEZ." This is inconsistent with how the Council addresses species that move within and outside the EEZ (e.g. billfish, tunas), and fails to account for the dynamic and potentially shifting climatic and oceanographic conditions that strongly influence forage fish populations. This limiting factor would undermine the ecosystem approach to management.

Third, we are concerned with the inclusion of the likelihood of the development of a new fishery as a limiting factor in the preliminary list of forage fish. The speculative nature of this type of information is not a coherent, durable approach to targeting species for inclusion in Initiative #1. Instead, we urge that the entire preliminary list be offered for protection under Initiative #1.

Conclusion

Ocean Conservancy is appreciative of the Council's work to implement the Fishery Ecosystem Plan and protect unmanaged forage fish to sustain the Pacific ecosystem. We strongly urge the Council to take action in September to initiate one or more FMP amendments to bring protections to these critically important unmanaged species. Further, we request that the Council direct the *ad hoc* committee to report back in the spring of 2014 with a range of alternatives that address these procedural issues and provide the Council with a set of options from which to choose. The Council and its advisory bodies should to focus keenly on the ecosystem protection goal of the FEP and

Initiative in resolving remaining policy and procedural issues, and work towards the broadest application of FMP protections for unmanaged forage fish. We look forward to participating in this important process as it unfolds over the next year.

As Idaho's leading voice for conservation working hard to protect Idaho environment, we ask that you fulfill the commitment you made a year ago to prohibit unregulated fisheries targeting forage fish on the West Coast. It is now time for the Council to act.

The Idaho Conservation League works to create an informed and engaged conservation majority in Idaho. By building a robust conservation community, we hope to influence local, state and federal policies to ensure adequate protections for clean water, clean air, healthy families and Idaho's unique way of life.

Let me begin with a personal note. I've spent considerable time in the wilderness of Idaho. There is nothing, NOTHING, that compares to being in a high-altitude wilderness area, such as in Chamberlain Basin or Loon Creek in the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness and seeing a salmon or steelhead. I have done this many times. Seeing these wild fish many hundreds of miles from the ocean is deeply inspiring. Idaho is far from the ocean, and while we know our rivers and streams ultimately get there—often being well-worked along the way—it is the returning salmon and steelhead that truly remind us we are part of the Pacific Northwest.

Idahoans know that healthy salmon and steelhead populations and strong numbers of returning fish depend on what we've typically referred to as favorable ocean conditions. Scientists have come to better understand what makes up those conditions, concluding that forage fish play a critical role in providing both cover for ocean-bound smolts in the Columbia estuary and a critical food source for adult salmon and steelhead in the ocean. A recent scientific analysis conducted by the Northwest Power and Conservation Council found that the Columbia's estuary and plume are "exceptionally important" in determining the proportion of juvenile salmon and steelhead trout that will return to the basin as spawning adults, largely because of the presence of forage fish. We spend \$250 million a year to offset the damage to salmon habitat caused by federal hydroelectric dams. It makes sense that decision makers also do what they can to maintain a healthy ocean ecosystem upon which our salmon and steelhead rely.

The Council's top priority should be to leave enough of these prey fish in the water to sustain a balanced and productive Pacific marine ecosystem. We are encouraged that the Council has stated its intention to prohibit new fisheries targeting currently unmanaged forage fish such as sand lance, saury and smelt until management plans are in place that fully assess the impacts of any new forage fisheries on the ocean food web. Now we ask the Council to fulfill its commitment and put in place management measures to protect these and other important forage species that are vulnerable to unregulated fisheries.

We appreciate the attention the Council has given to forage fish conservation efforts throughout the development of your ecosystem plan. By acting now, the Council has a chance to help ensure a healthy Pacific Ocean and stronger salmon and steelhead runs, helping to preserve Idaho's unique way of life.

Idaho provides critical headwaters habitat to vulnerable salmon and steelhead. Idaho has admirably worked to protect this habitat. It is important to us that 'our' fish are well tended to in the ocean. Your work is important to ensure that.

Dear Ms. Lowman and Council members:

Earthjustice offers the following comments with respect to the Council's efforts to implement the Fishery Ecosystem Plan's Ecosystem-Based Initiative 1 to protect unmanaged forage species off the U.S. West Coast. We appreciate the Council's continued work to develop measures necessary to conserve these species. Establishing conservation measures for currently unmanaged forage species is consistent with the best available scientific information, which shows that these species are both important for maintaining ecosystem health and vulnerable to fishing impacts. It is also consistent with the Magnuson Fishery Conservation and Management Act's ("MSA") mandate to implement measures that promote the health of ocean ecosystems and protect fishery resources for the benefit of all ocean stakeholders.

We support the comments on this topic that have been submitted by Oceana and The Pew Charitable Trusts, and join them in requesting that the Council formally initiate the regulatory amendment process at its September 2013 meeting to prohibit fishing for all unmanaged forage species.

The Fishery Ecosystem Plan ("FEP") and the ecosystem-based initiative process that the Council adopted in April 2013 marked an important step forward in achieving sustainable fisheries management. We commend the Council, the Ecosystem Plan Development Team, and the Ecosystem Advisory Subpanel for their work on the FEP and efforts to move forward with implementing Initiative 1.

However, we are concerned that the criteria set forth in the FEP Initiative 1 document for determining whether forage species qualify for additional protections from future fisheries are not consistent with the purposes and requirements of the MSA.

First, the decision process outlined on page A-10 of the FEP appendix indicates that a species that is managed under a state program, but not necessarily under a federal one, would not qualify as an "unmanaged" species and therefore would not receive any additional protection from the Council. Excluding species that are managed under state authority is entirely inconsistent with the MSA.

The MSA explicitly gives this Council "authority over the fisheries in the Pacific Ocean seaward of [California, Oregon, Washington, and Idaho]," and charges the Council with developing measures necessary for the conservation and management of stocks within its authority. 16 U.S.C. §§ 1852(a)(1)(F), 1852(h)(1). It is true that a State generally has primary authority to regulate fishing activities within its own State waters. However, when it comes to regulating fishing activities in federal waters, the State may only regulate vessels registered within that State, and only if the State's regulations do not conflict with federal regulations, or the State has been delegated management authority by a federal fishery management plan and the State's regulations are consistent with that plan. *Id.* at § 1856(a). The law thus makes clear that the National Marine Fisheries Service and the Council have primary responsibility for managing fishery resources in federal waters. Nothing in the MSA supports the notion that the Council may decline to exercise its authority to regulate fishing for a species in need of conservation and management in federal waters simply because that species is being managed under a state program.

Second, the decision process also suggests that species that do not occur "exclusively or primarily within the U.S. West Coast EEZ" are "not subject to Council authority." FEP appendix at A-10. This is incorrect. The MSA provides that "the United States claims, and will exercise in the manner provided for in this Act, sovereign rights and exclusive fishery management authority over all fish, and all Continental Shelf fishery resources, within the exclusive economic zone." 16 U.S.C. § 1811(a). The MSA also grants the Council authority to manage highly migratory species in cooperation with appropriate international organizations. *Id.* at § 1812. Nothing in either of these provisions suggests that a stock must occur "exclusively or primarily" within the EEZ in order to be subject to the Council's authority. To the contrary, the MSA gives the Council authority over "all" fish and Continental Shelf fishery resources in the U.S. West Coast EEZ, regardless what portion of the overall stock those fish represent. *Id.* at §§ 1811(a), 1852(a)(1).

Moreover, excluding species from conservation and management based on either of the criteria discussed above would be inconsistent with the MSA National Standard 3 requirement that stocks be managed as a unit. 16 U.S.C. § 1851(a)(3). Regulatory guidelines for National Standard 3 state that a fishery management planning should cover the entire range of a stock "and not be overly constrained by political boundaries." 50 C.F.R. § 600.320(b). Where a stock occurs in multiple jurisdictions, federal fishery managers are expected to coordinate management those jurisdictions. *Id.* at § 600.320(c). Notably, the regulatory guidelines do not contemplate a situation in which federal fishery managers forego management altogether simply because a portion of the stock occurs and may be regulated in another jurisdiction. Where a stock occurs in both U.S. and international waters, "FMPs should include conservation and management measures for that part of the management unit within U.S. waters." *Id.* at § 600.320(d)(2). In other words, National Standard 3 requires the Council to apply its authority to manage the portion of a stock that occurs within federal waters and coordinate with states and other jurisdictions to achieve sustainable management of the stock as a whole.

In light of the issues discussed above, we request that the Council make clear and instruct the *ad hoc* committee that all forage species that occur within the West Coast U.S. EEZ and are not currently under active federal management qualify for protections from new fisheries under the

FEP Initiative 1. Specifically, the Council should apply such protections to species that currently are managed under state authority but not under federal authority, as well as species that occur within the U.S. West Coast EEZ but do no occur primarily or exclusively in this area.

We appreciate your continued work to move towards an ecosystem-based approach to fisheries management that supports the health of the California Current ecosystem and look forward to participating in this important effort. Please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions.

Where I work much of the time in Mexico the pig farmers have taken over the shrimp and sardine fleets to rake the ocean of every potential protein/omegas source of fodder for pork production.

The california current is no exception to this pressure on the ocean food web base **whose natural state is abundance.** Food web ecology reality is that all forage species, especially those that convert phytoplankton, should be protected.

I urge the Council to place all unmanaged forage fish and other forage species into their appropriate management plans. The first rule of ecology is that everything is connected and every disconnect we make is a mistake, and counter productive. Why not go for the gold standard of complete food web protection/management for the California Current and waters under your jurisdiction.

I am writing to ask you to vote in September to bring forage fish species under management as soon as possible. Forage fish are critically important to the ocean ecosystem.

Placing currently unmanaged forage fish in appropriate fishery management plans is the simplest way for the Council to follow through on the objective it set in 2012 to prohibit new fishing on forage species until it evaluates the effect on the ocean food web.

I commend the Council for its recent efforts to maintain a healthy ocean, including the unanimous adoption of a fishery ecosystem plan earlier this year. The plan's first concrete initiative calls for protecting unmanaged forage fish. Since 1975, TMMC has been headquartered in Sausalito, CA in the Marin Headlands within the Golden Gate National Parks, and has rescued and treated more than 18,000 marine mammals.

The Fishery Ecosystem Plan (FEP) is of great interest to TMMC as we endeavor to treat patients and study the causes of their illnesses, and seek to inspire greater stewardship of our coastal waters. This past spring, TMMC responded, along with peer institutions along the California coast, to an unusual morbidity event (UME) with California sea lions in southern California. More than 1,400 sea lions stranded, severely malnourished, during a period of several weeks beginning in January. In a more typical year, only 200 would have stranded. While it is not completely clear why this event occurred, we suspect, based on the condition of the animals that stranded, that primary forage fish for this species were not at typical levels.

On behalf of TMMC, I encourage you to implement the "ecosystem initiative" under the new FEP -- to protect forage fish that are currently vulnerable to unregulated fisheries. Enacting this initiative will fulfill the intent of the Council to ensure the science is in place to determine the effect on existing fisheries and coastal communities before permitting new fisheries to target forage fish. As the global demand for forage fish rises, this is the time to enact a precautionary policy to protect a critical component of the natural resource that we all rely upon.

A productive marine ecosystem is both a cultural resource for coastal communities and an economic engine that generates billions of dollars each year through sustainable fisheries, the consumption of fresh local seafood, whale-watching, birding, recreational fishing and other marine-based activities. In California alone, a productive marine food web helps to generate \$43 billion annually in ocean-dependent revenue, according to a study cited in 2006 by the West Coast Governors Alliance on Ocean Health. Thousands of West Coast citizens have offered comments over the past two years urging the Council to conserve forage fish as the cornerstone of this vital economic and cultural resource.

We are encouraged that the Council has reached consensus over the need to protect these ecologically and economically critical species. Now, we look forward to the Council taking action that gives all of us greater confidence that we can rely on a healthy ocean for years to come.

Dear Chairman Wolford and Council Members,

As Idaho outdoor enthusiasts and fishermen who care about a productive ocean, we ask that you fulfill the commitment you made a year ago and implement measures to prohibit unregulated fisheries targeting forage fish on the West Coast. It is time for the Council to act.

Fishermen in Idaho know that healthy salmon and steelhead populations and strong numbers of returning fish are dependent on what we've typically referred to as favorable ocean conditions. Scientists have come to better understand what makes up those conditions, concluding that forage fish play a critical role in providing both cover at the Columbia estuary and a critical protein source for young salmon and steelhead.

Forage fish form the key link in the marine food web, by eating plankton and converting it into protein for bigger fish, seabirds, and marine mammals. Healthy and robust populations of game fish such as tuna and salmon, in turn, support a recreational fishing sector both on the coast and here in Idaho, where restored salmon and steelhead fishing could potentially generate more than \$500 million in economic activity per year.

We also know that wild-caught forage fish is a global commodity, and that worldwide demand is rising, for purposes such as feeding livestock, poultry and domestic pets.

We believe the Council's top priority should be to leave enough of these food fish in the water to sustain a balanced and productive Pacific marine ecosystem. The council deserves credit for its recent efforts to maintain a healthy ocean, including the unanimous adoption of a fishery ecosystem plan earlier this year. RE: Ecosystem-Based Initiative #1 – Protecting Unmanaged Forage Species

Dear Ms. Lowman and Council members,

We write to express our thoughts regarding ecosystem-based initiative #1 to protect unmanaged forage species. We greatly appreciate and support the Pacific Fishery Management Council's (Council) efforts to establish protections for unmanaged forage fish through existing Fishery Management Plan (FMP) authority. At the September meeting in Boise, we request that the Council formally initiate the FMP amendment process to incorporate unmanaged forage species into the appropriate FMPs and establish conservation and management measures to protect these species from unregulated fishing.

In April 2013, the Council adopted its first Fishery Ecosystem Plan (FEP) and established an ecosystem-based initiative process. The April motion also provided guidance on next steps for the implementation of initiative #1 to protect unmanaged forage species. This guidance included the formation of an *ad hoc* committee to carry out the initiative and a set of tasks for the committee to report back on at the September Council meeting. We are grateful for the guidance provided by the Council in April, the formation of the *ad hoc* committee in June, and we look forward to participating in the process moving forward.

Our comments below include our requests for actions to be taken at the September 2013 meeting, our perspective on the tasks assigned to the *ad hoc* committee, and our comments and suggestions on the policy questions that will need to be answered as the FMP amendment process moves forward.

Summary of Requests for Initiative #1

- Vote to formally initiate an FMP amendment process to protect unmanaged forage species.
- Direct the *ad hoc* committee to report back in the spring of 2014 with a range of FMP amendment alternatives for Council consideration and public comment.
- Provide the following guidance to the committee:
 - o Define species to be protected by highest taxanomical grouping.
 - Consider species unmanaged unless actively managed.
 - o Include all species that occur in the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ).

- Ensure that species classification and management measures provide for ecosystem protection.
- Schedule time in the spring and fall of 2014 to consider and select preferred alternatives, and conduct analyses per National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements.

Assigned Tasks from April 2013 Motion

Our itemized comments below include our perspective and requests regarding each of the 5 main tasks assigned to the *ad hoc* committee by the motion approved unanimously by the Council in April 2013. This motion provided guidance on first steps for implementation of initiative #1 and directed the *ad hoc* committee to:

- Work from the preliminary summary of low-trophic-level (forage) species² (preliminary list) and the flow chart³ included in the FEP appendix to identify species eligible for protection.
- Assess the likelihood of fisheries developing on the unmanaged species from the preliminary list.
- Evaluate whether general gear restrictions or prohibitions could be enacted to restrict potential fishing on the unmanaged species from the preliminary list.
- Develop a process and next steps for implementation of initiative #1.
- Develop a definitive timeline for initiative #1 to be discussed under workload planning.

Preliminary List of Species and Flow Chart

The preliminary summary of select forage species in the California Current Ecosystem developed by the Ecosystem Plan Development Team (EPDT) represents a comprehensive list of forage species present in the California Current ecosystem. Notably and appropriately, it excludes those species that are forage as juveniles and transition to higher trophic levels as adults. Additionally, it includes non-finfish species such as pelagic squids that are both key prey for many predators and the target of commercial fisheries in other regions. In summary, the preliminary list developed by the EPDT covers those species that should be protected through initiative #1.

The FEP appendix also contains a flow chart or set of filters developed by the EPDT that it suggests be applied to the preliminary list in order to determine what species qualify for protection through initiative #1. (see Figure 1 on page 10) It further spells out the broad procedural steps necessary in order to select and amend appropriate FMPs and establish conservation measures to protect the qualified species. Our additional comments and recommendations on the preliminary list of species and corresponding flow chart are discussed below.

Define Forage Species by Highest Taxonomical Grouping Possible

We agree with the approach taken by the EPDT in developing the preliminary list that organizes the species by the highest taxonomical grouping possible. This approach provides for ease of management and reduces workload associated with implementing the FMP amendment. As stated in the Federal Register notice implementing precautionary forage policies in the North Pacific Groundfish FMPs:

These species have been grouped together because they are considered to be primary food resources for other marine animals and they have the potential to be the targets of a commercial fishery.⁶

Unless Actively Managed, Species Should Be Considered Unmanaged

The preliminary list clarifies which forage species are unmanaged and which are managed by federal, state or tribal governments and thus ineligible for protection through this initiative. However, just because a particular forage species may fall under the jurisdiction of a state management program should not render it ineligible for protection through initiative #1. For example, the state of Washington has a Forage Fish Management Plan that includes Pacific sandlance and surf smelt. The state of Oregon also includes several species of smelt and silversides in the list of species included in the appendix of its Nearshore Strategy. However, neither of these facts prevents these species from becoming the target of commercial fisheries in federal waters off of either state.

The Ecosystem Advisory Subpanel (EAS) also noted this issue and the need to avoid disqualifying key unmanaged forage species from being protected through initiative #1 in its April 2013 supplemental report:

"...the statement that species "under the jurisdiction of a state management program" would not be subject to the prohibition on new fisheries could lead to confusion. For example, Pacific sand lance are listed under Washington's forage fish management plan. There are no actively managed fisheries for this forage species along the west coast, and they could be protected under Initiative 1."

All Species that Occur in the EEZ Should Qualify for Protection

The flow chart also requires that the species to be protected "occur exclusively or primarily within the U.S. West Coast EEZ." This is another unnecessary constraint on the list of species eligible for protection. Moreover, it is inconsistent with the Council's management of other species that occur neither primarily nor exclusively within the EEZ. For example, the Council manages fisheries that target highly migratory species such as tunas and billfish. These species migrate into and out of the EEZ on a seasonal basis, yet this fact does not preclude the Council from establishing conservation and management measures for these fisheries.

The EAS also noted this inconsistency in its supplemental report submitted at the April 2013 Council meeting and offered the following recommendation:

"...the decision tree presented in Figure A.1 on page A-8 would limit Council's action on unfished forage species to those that "occur primarily or exclusively" within federal waters. This is an unnecessary constraint and should be omitted in favor of including any species that occurs in federal waters." 10

Last, the Council should consider offering protection through initiative #1 for those subtropical and tropical forage species that do not currently occur in significant numbers in the EEZ, but whose range may expand with global climate shifts. For example, pacific anchoveta and deep body anchovy both occur off the coast of Baja California, 11 are important forage species, and may expand into the EEZ in significant numbers in the future. 12 These species should also be offered protection through initiative #1.

Likelihood of New Fisheries Occurring

Assessing the potential for new fisheries on unmanaged forage species can be done by identifying those species that are the target of commercial fisheries elsewhere or by identifying potential markets for particular species. The preliminary list developed by the EPDT includes general information about the relative fishery potential for unmanaged forage species and is a good starting point for the discussion. Notably, all but two of the unmanaged species on the preliminary list were found by the EPDT to have significant fishery potential.

The only two categories described as having limited or little fishery potential are mesopelagic fishes (*Myctophidae*, *Bathylagidae*, etc) and Pacific tomcod. In the case of

mesopelagic fishes, technology is purported as the limiting factor, though there is evidence of myctophid (lanternfish) fisheries being prosecuted in the Arabian Sea, off the Western and Southern Coasts of Africa and in the Southern Atlantic. ¹⁴ In fact, the Commission for Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources has permitted a total allowable catch of 200,000t for myctophids in its convention area. ¹⁵ Additionally, research is currently being conducted on the utilization of myctophids in developing surimi products for human consumption. ¹⁶ Regarding Pacific tomcod, it is a marine sportfish on the West Coast caught in nearshore waters ¹⁷ and there are recorded commercial landings off the West Coast in 1998, 1999 and 2003. ¹⁸

The November 2011 draft of the FEP included a market-based analysis of the potential for fisheries to develop on unmanaged forage species in the California Current Ecosystem. (see Figure 2 on page 11) Consistent with the potential described in the preliminary list, this analysis shows that many of the unmanaged forage species are in fact landed in commercial quantities globally. These facts demonstrate that each and every unmanaged species included on the preliminary list has the potential to become the target of a future commercial fishery in the EEZ off the West Coast. Consequently, all species on the preliminary list should qualify and be offered protection through initiative #1.

Potential Gear Restrictions

The April 2013 motion directed the *ad hoc* committee to assess whether there are general gear restrictions and/or prohibitions that could be used to restrict catch of these species and thereby meet the Council's stated objective for unmanaged forage species. Presumably, under this approach the Council would adopt measures for unmanaged forage species - through amendments to appropriate FMPs - that prohibit directed fishing with both seine and trawl gear types, as they are the dominant gear types associated with forage fisheries. Effectively, this would mean that if the Council decided to consider allowing a new fishery on one of these species, it would have to amend the appropriate FMP. This process is subject to NEPA and would require an environmental assessment or impact statement before such a federal action could be implemented. Requiring an FMP amendment before allowing a new fishery would also provide the Council with the opportunity to conduct its own scientific review and apply its own criteria in considering the new fishery.

If the Council does decide to pursue gear restrictions as a mechanism to achieving its stated objective for unmanaged forage species, it is important to bear in mind the ultimate intent of the objective. Preventing the development of new forage fisheries is

not a goal in and of itself, but is rather a means toward accomplishing the ultimate objective of protecting and conserving the forage base that is essential for a healthy marine ecosystem. Gear restrictions alone would not accomplish this objective. Therefore, it is critical that there be rigorous, ecosystem-based scientific standards and criteria in place with which to evaluate any new fishery proposal before amending an FMP as described above.

Next Steps & Process Moving Forward

The April 2013 motion further directs the *ad hoc* committee to report back with a proposed process and next steps for implementing initiative #1. Having this information for the Council to consider in September will be a crucial and necessary part of what it needs to initiate the FMP amendment process as laid out in the description of initiative #1. While completion of the initial tasks assigned in the April 2013 motion should produce information needed for the Council to initiate the FMP amendment process at this meeting, answers to the three questions below will be needed to inform that process moving forward. These procedural questions are included in the flow chart from the FEP appendix and are discussed here. Upon initiation of the FMP amendment process, we request that the Council direct the *ad hoc* committee to report back in the spring of 2014 with a range of alternatives that address these procedural issues and provide the Council with a set of options from which to choose.

Which FMP?

The Council will need to decide which FMP or FMPs best accommodate these species and the protective measures to be enacted. There are several methods that can be employed to establish the nexus between a particular FMP and the species to be protected. One option is for unmanaged forage species to be incorporated into the FMP that contains taxonomically similar species. Or, they could be incorporated into the FMP that contains their predators. They could also be incorporated into the FMP with which they are most likely to interact as bycatch or incidental catch. It may also be appropriate to initiate an omnibus amendment that would incorporate the unmanaged forages species into more than one FMP.

As the *ad hoc* committee seeks to address this issue, we refer to previous correspondence submitted by Pew that provided a table comparing the approaches taken in the past to protect forage species by both the Pacific and North Pacific Councils. ¹⁹ (see *Table 1 on page 12*)

In the past, we have advocated for these species to be incorporated into the Coastal Pelagic Species (CPS) for a number of reasons, including the facts that maintaining adequate forage for dependent species is a goal of the CPS FMP and that the FMP itself was created to manage for future fishery expansion. ²⁰ We would also support an

omnibus amendment that would bring species into both the CPS and Groundfish FMPs. However, in order to ensure protection of the ecosystem, the choice of FMP is less significant than the specific conservation measures enacted to protect qualifying forage species.

Fishery Management Unit Species or Ecosystem Component Species?

As species are added to FMPs, they may be classified as either Fishery Management Unit (FMU) species or Ecosystem Component (EC) species. This determination is based upon the particular association the species has with the stocks in the fishery, as well as the description of EC species provided in the National Standard guidelines.²¹ FMU species would require status determination criteria (SDCs) be developed for them, whereas EC species would not. Given the prohibitive nature of the Council's objective for unmanaged forage fish, establishing SDCs would not be necessary until a new fishery is proposed.

However, while EC species are exempt from status determination criteria, they can have conservation and management measures enacted for them, even though they are not technically "in the fishery." 22 For example the Arctic FMP enacted management measures to prohibit commercial fishing on all species, including EC species, until information is available to support sustainable management of any future authorized fishery.²³ This approach is consistent with section 303(b)(12) of the Magnuson-Stevens Act, which provides authority for FMPs to include management to conserve target and non-target species and habitats, considering the variety of ecological factors affecting fishery populations.²⁴ Similarly, we urge the Council to designate these unmanaged forage species as ecosystem component species and adopt management measures to prohibit directed commercial fishing for these species until adequate science and management is in place.

What Management Measures should be Implemented?

Again, the Arctic FMP provides an example that can be of use in addressing this question. That FMP sought to protect the Arctic ecosystem by ensuring that any proposed fishing activity would be sustainable before allowing it. The reason for adopting similar management measures for unmanaged forage species in the West Coast EEZ is to maintain the role they play in the California Current ecosystem and protect them from unregulated catch harvest unless and until information is available to support ecologically sustainable management of any future fishery.

To accommodate the potential for future fisheries, the Arctic FMP provides a process by which a species can be moved from the ecosystem component category into the actively managed category. Similarly, the Council can provide a process and criteria by

which a forage species could be moved into the actively managed category should it wish to consider authorizing a sustainable fishery on that stock. Whether through gear prohibitions as discussed above, or through an established set of scientific criteria, the critical piece is that the Council is provided the opportunity to review the science and deliberate on the merits of each new fishery proposal before allowing it to proceed.

Timeline

Upon receiving the forthcoming report from the *ad hoc* committee at the September meeting, the Council should have the information it needs to initiate the FMP amendment process, including a set of proposed revisions to consider for the list of species that qualify for protection. After receiving this report, we urge the Council to initiate the FMP amendment process and adopt a workplan and timeline that directs the *ad hoc* committee to again report back in the spring of 2014 with a range of alternatives for addressing the following questions:

- In which FMP do the unmanaged forage species belong?
- Should the unmanaged forage species be designated as EC or FMU species?
- What conservation and management measures should be enacted for these species?

Once the Council has the information it needs to address those questions it can determine how it wants to proceed with the FMP amendment process and begin conducting the required NEPA analyses. Moving forward from there, we recommend scheduling time to select preferred alternatives in the fall of 2014.

Conclusion

The status-quo policy for unmanaged forage species does not adequately ensure protection of the marine environment upon which our valuable fisheries depend. Given what we know about their critical ecological and economic importance, action is needed to protect them from unregulated new fisheries that could develop in the absence of adequate scientific information. In order to ensure the ecological role that unmanaged forage species play, permanent protections for them must be housed in an FMP with the regulatory authority to enact conservation and management measures. That is the only way to bring these unmanaged forage species under the Council's jurisdiction, thereby ensuring that before any new fisheries begin, the appropriate science is conducted to make certain that any such fishery would be sustainable and not harm the target forage species, the marine ecosystem, or other valuable fisheries.

The need to manage for potential future fishery expansion calls for proactive and precautionary measures. In June 2012, the Council recognized this need and voted to protect and maintain the health of the marine ecosystem that we depend upon. The Council and its advisory bodies, along with state and federal agency staff have the knowledge and expertise necessary to develop a comprehensive suite of alternate

management options from which the Council can choose. Now is the time to take action and start the process to implement that objective.

Thank you again for the opportunity to participate in this public process and share our hope that the Council will move toward an ecosystem-based approach to fisheries management that protects the California Current forage base. We look forward to working with the Council and all stakeholders to maintain healthy oceans and sustainable fisheries.





Healthy oceans: Pacific Fishery Management Council must protect forage fish

Here along the West Coast, seafood lovers and recreational anglers both enjoy access to one of America's greatest natural assets — the rich array of seafood teeming just off our shore. Our commercial fleet provides the public with fresh tuna, salmon, lingcod and other ocean delicacies, while sport fishermen relish the opportunity to catch their own.

West Coast fishery managers have a chance right now to help conserve this incredible resource by improving protection of the little fish that sustain a productive ocean. When it meets Monday and Tuesday in Idaho, the Pacific Fishery Management Council should step up protection of forage fish.

These small schooling fish, such as smelt, aren't as well known to the general public, but they form a crucial part of the diet of their better-known predators, which end up on our dinner plates.

As the executive director of the Pacific Coast's largest commercial fishing trade organization and the founder of one of the largest boating supply companies in the world, we both have advocated for improving protection of forage fish.

It's important for the council to act now.

Demand is growing to remove vast quantities of prey fish from marine ecosystems, largely to feed farmed fish overseas. Two years ago, a committee advising West Coast fishery managers acknowledged that the "spectacular growth" of the global aquaculture industry —

and the imperative to feed farmed fish with wild-caught forage fish like sardines — raises the likelihood for unregulated fishing to begin on West Coast forage species that aren't managed or monitored.

Fortunately, the Pacific Fishery Management Council is beginning to recognize the role of forage fish in sustaining ocean wildlife and coastal economies. Specifically, the council is considering new measures to prevent unregulated fishing from starting on previously overlooked species like lanternfish, sand lance, Pacific saury and various kinds of smelts. Many of these species remain obscure to the general public, but they are among the category of bait fish that are critical to a well-functioning marine ecosystem.

Forage fish eat plankton and then are preyed upon by marine mammals, seabirds and bigger fish, including iconic species such as salmon, tuna, and lingcod that many of us love to catch and eat.

Put simply, big fish need lots of little fish.

Some may wonder why we should bother with protections, since no one is currently targeting sand lance or other unmanaged forage fish on the West Coast. To answer that question, it's worth looking north to Alaska. North Pacific fishery managers proactively protected dozens of forage species more than a decade ago with the strong support of commercial fishermen, who understood the importance of the small

prey that sustains lucrative fisheries targeting their predators.

Protecting forage fish isn't just good for the environment, it's also good business. In California alone, a productive marine food web generates \$43 billion annually in ocean-dependent revenue, according to a study cited back in 2006 by the West Coast Governors Alliance on Ocean Health.

Signs of a healthy ocean go well beyond seafood. Pelicans and sooty shearwaters gliding along the surface, lots of seals, whales and dolphins, fishermen filling their holds all illustrate a healthy marine ecosystem that distinguishes America's West Coast from many other parts of the world.

The time to act isn't when a crisis is right on top of us. Whether you fish for a living or run a business here on land, good planning requires the ability to anticipate problems and adjust accordingly. West Coast fishery leaders should act now to protect forage fish that aren't — yet — being targeted.

A healthy ocean depends on it.

Dear Chairman Lowman and Council Members,

As outdoor enthusiasts and fishermen who care about a productive ocean, we ask that you fulfill the commitment you made a year ago and implement measures to prohibit unregulated fisheries targeting forage fish on the West Coast. It is time for the Council to act.

Fishermen know that bait in the water translates to fish in the boat.

Forage fish form the key link in the marine food web on the Pacific coast, by eating plankton and converting it into protein for bigger fish, seabirds, and marine mammals. Healthy and robust populations of game fish such as salmon, tuna and ling cod, in turn, support a recreational fishing sector that employs over 18,000 people and generates \$2.2 billion in annual spending on saltwater fishing and equipment in California, Oregon and Washington.

We also know that wild-caught forage fish is a global commodity, and that worldwide demand is rising to use it for purposes such as feeding livestock, poultry and farmed fish overseas.

We believe the Council's top priority should be to leave enough of these food fish in the water to sustain a balanced and productive marine ecosystem here on the Pacific coast. We are encouraged that the Council has stated its intention to prohibit new fisheries targeting currently unmanaged forage fish such as sand lance, saury and smelt until management plans are in place that fully assess the impacts of any fishing on the ocean food web. Now we ask the Council to fulfill its commitment and put in place management measures to protect these and other important forage species that are vulnerable to unregulated fisheries.

We appreciate the attention the Council has given to forage fish conservation efforts throughout the development of your ecosystem plan. By acting now, the Council has a chance to help ensure a healthy Pacific Ocean for generations to come.

Dear Chairman Wolford and Council Members,

Representing Idaho outdoor anglers who care about salmon and steelhead, the Idaho Council of Trout Unlimited ask the Pacific Fishery Management Council (Council) to fulfill the commitment it made a year ago to prohibit unregulated fisheries targeting forage fish on the West Coast. The time to act is now, and we urge the Council to begin the process of amending one or more of its management plans to extend protection to currently unmanaged forage species.

The Idaho Council of Trout Unlimited works to conserve, protect, reconnect, and restore Idaho's coldwater fisheries and watersheds. While our fisheries may be located hundreds of miles from the ocean, we know that recovering salmon and steelhead runs depend on a healthy ocean ecosystem. Every year, millions of ocean-bound juvenile salmon and steelhead migrate through mountain streams, over dams, and past cities and farms. Their survival depends to a large degree on forage fish as cover from an array of predators. Later, after leaving the river, they depend on forage fish as a critical food source for the bulk of their life cycle in the ocean.

The Northwest Power and Conservation Council (NPCC) wrote a letter in November 2012 stating that electric ratepayers spend \$250 million a year to offset the damage to salmon habitat caused by federal hydroelectric dams. In its letter to the PFMC, the NPCC cited its independent scientific analysis finding that the Columbia's estuary and plume are "exceptionally important" in determining the proportion of juvenile salmon and steelhead trout that will return to the basin as spawning adults, largely because of the presence of forage fish.

The Idaho Council of Trout Unlimited is supportive and appreciative of the Council's attention to this matter and the work it has done to transition to an ecosystem-based approach to fisheries management by adopting a Fishery Ecosystem Plan. We understand the Council doesn't control all of the factors affecting the survival and recovery of Pacific salmon and steelhead. Significant money and effort is expended to restore their freshwater habitats, yet salmon and steelhead spend the majority of their lives in the Pacific ocean and we are dedicated to ensuring they have the best chance possible to return. The Council has an opportunity now to take an important step forward in helping to maintain a healthy ocean ecosystem so our salmon and steelhead can return home to Idaho.
