## COASTAL PELAGIC SPECIES PROPOSED GENERAL SCHEDULE 2018 – 2019

At the April 2018 meeting, the Pacific Fishery Management Council (Council) directed several Council Advisory Bodies to develop reports on a variety of coastal pelagic species-related topics. Council staff has coordinated discussions on these items among representatives of the Coastal Pelagic Species Management Team (CPSMT), Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC), Southwest Fisheries Science Center (SWFSC), and National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) by phone on June 1 2018, and during the SSC's future workload planning session on June 7, 2018. The group discussed how best to develop reports, what missing information is necessary to fulfill the Council's requests, who will be in the lead for each task, and the timeline for completion. The group will continue coordinating to complete and review the assigned tasks. The table on the next page provides a general schedule and other information. A more detailed version of this table was developed for internal planning purposes, and it has been circulated, reviewed, and discussed by the group.
