- 5. NMFS will develop a method to close the fishery or reduce the trip limit via United States Coast Guard radio transmittal, or other means that will halt additional fishing in the most timely manner possible.

The Council also recommended that the 2019 ISC Pacific bluefin Management Strategy Evaluation workshop be held at a location on the U.S. West Coast.

The Council directed its HMS Management Team (HMSMT) to analyze fishing effort in the West Coast North Pacific albacore fishery to support discussions at the IATTC about specifying effort limits consistent with Resolution C-05-02. Based on the comparable Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC) conservation and management measure, the WCPFC Northem Committee (NC) defined the effort limit as the 2002-2004 average level. A fishing effort analysis could also support a change in the NC effort definition, to harmonize it with any limit adopted by the IATTC.
