DRAFT COUNCIL OPERATING PROCEDURE 22: PROCESS FOR ESSENTIAL
FISH HABITAT REVIEW AND MODIFICATION

#### **PURPOSE**

To guide the Council's review and modification of essential fish habitat (EFH) provisions in FMPs, including identification and description of EFH, fishing and non-fishing impacts, recommended conservation measures, habitat areas of particular concern, and other provisions of EFH.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

1. To ensure that the EFH provisions in the Council's FMPs are consistent with the best

- scientific information available.
- 2. To ensure a transparent **and efficient science-based** process for review of new information, and consideration of any potential changes to EFH provisions.

### **EFH PERIODIC REVIEW PROCESS**

No more than five years after completing a review and any modifications of an FMP's EFH provisions, the Council should initiate a new review. The Council may conduct a review of some EFH elements, such as HAPC, in the interim period; however, changes to HAPC or other EFH elements in between full EFH reviews will only be contemplated in unusual cases in which notable harm might result by inaction. The review should include the evaluation of published and unpublished scientific literature and reports, information from interested parties, and previously unavailable or inaccessible data. The Council will identify the appropriate Council and/or National Marine Fisheries Service staff lead(s) to coordinate the review, working with subject area experts, Council Advisory Bodies, and others to complete a review consistent with Federal regulatory guidance at 50 CFR 600, Subpart J.

In determining the scope and schedule of the review, the Council should consider recommendations from prior reviews, clearly identify the purpose and measurable objectives for the review and habitat conservation objectives for any amendments to EFH, and solicit input from its Advisory Bodies and the public.

As appropriate, the review may be scoped in two phases. In the first phase the project lead(s) and subject matter experts (i.e., federal/state agencies, tribes, academia) will conduct a thorough review of the best available scientific information on the EFH provisions contained in a particular FMP. Based on this review, and considering input from its advisory bodies and the public, the Council may embark on a second phase.in which changes to EFH provisions for that FMP, as well as commensurate minimization measures, are considered for Council adoption.

Prior to initiating a review, the Council should adopt a process and schedule for both the review phase, and if necessary, the second phase in which changes to EFH provisions are considered. The process and schedule will contain details such as key participants and steps relevant to the subject FMP.

- 2. Initiate an "Amendment 28 post-mortem" by requesting the EFH Project Team to consider how to conduct a survey of all interested individuals to gather the lessons learned and recommendations for EFH review procedures. The PT should report back to the Council with plans for such a survey in June.
- 3. Develop groundfish EFH review guidelines after receiving the post-mortem survey feedback and prior to initiating the next full EFH review.

Sigma, coupled with the overfishing probability (P\*), is used to determine ABC buffers for these species. The sigma value is intended to address the scientific uncertainty in estimating the OFL and varies by the uncertainty associated with the stock category and the age of the stock assessment.

The Council also requested that the Northwest and Southwest Fisheries Science Centers' research improved sigma estimates that may be stock-specific or related to appropriate stock groups, prior to the 2023-2024 assessment cycle.

For commercial fisheries, the Council recommended changes to the following commercial nearshore rockfish fishery trip limits in the State of California:

1. For Limited Entry and Open Access Fixed Gear: 42° 00" N. Lat. to 40° 10' N. Lat., increase the minor nearshore rockfish (other than black rockfish) sub-limit to 1,500 lbs per two months as soon as possible.

2. For Limited Entry and Open Access Fixed Gear: 40° 10' N. Lat. to the Mexico Border, increase the deeper nearshore rockfish trip-limit to 1,200 lbs per two months beginning with trip Period 3 (May-June). Period two (March-April) will remain closed.

For recreational fisheries, the Council recommended the following rockfish bag limit changes in the State of California:

- 1. Increase the California canary rockfish (*Sebastes pinniger*) sub-bag limit from two (2) to three (3) fish within the overall 10-fish bag limit as soon as possible.
- 2. Increase the California black rockfish (*Sebastes melanops*) sub-bag limit from three (3) to four (4) fish within the overall 10-fish bag limit as soon as possible.

The 2019 coastwide total allowable catch (TAC) of 597,500 mt is the same as in 2017 and 2018, resulting in an allocation of 441,433 mt for U.S. fisheries.

# DRAFT COUNCIL OPERATING PROCEDURE 22: PROCESS FOR ESSENTIAL FISH HABITAT REVIEW AND MODIFICATION

### **PURPOSE**

To guide the Council's review and modification of essential fish habitat (EFH) provisions in FMPs, including identification and description of EFH, fishing and non-fishing impacts, recommended conservation measures, habitat areas of particular concern, and other provisions of EFH.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- 1. To ensure that the EFH provisions in the Council's FMPs are consistent with the best scientific information available.
- 2. To ensure a transparent **and efficient science-based** process for review of new information, and consideration of any potential changes to EFH provisions.

#### EFH PERIODIC REVIEW PROCESS

No more than five years after completing a review and any modifications of an FMP's EFH provisions, the Council should initiate a new review. The Council may conduct a review of some EFH elements, such as HAPC, in the interim period; however, changes to HAPC or other EFH elements in between full EFH reviews will only be contemplated in unusual cases in which notable harm might result by inaction. The review should include the evaluation of published and unpublished scientific literature and reports, information from interested parties, and previously unavailable or inaccessible data. The Council will identify the appropriate Council and/or National Marine Fisheries Service staff lead(s) to coordinate the review, working with subject area experts, Council Advisory Bodies, and others to complete a review consistent with Federal regulatory guidance at 50 CFR 600, Subpart J.

In determining the scope and schedule of the review, the Council should consider recommendations from prior reviews, clearly identify the purpose and measurable objectives for the review and habitat conservation objectives for any amendments to EFH, and solicit input from its Advisory Bodies and the public.

As appropriate, the review may be scoped in two phases. In the first phase the project lead(s) and subject matter experts (i.e., federal/state agencies, tribes, academia) will conduct a thorough review of the best available scientific information on the EFH provisions contained in a particular FMP. Based on this review, and considering input from its advisory bodies and the public, the Council may embark on a second phase.in which changes to EFH provisions for that FMP, as well as commensurate minimization measures, are considered for Council adoption.

Prior to initiating a review, the Council should adopt a process and schedule for both the review phase, and if necessary, the second phase in which changes to EFH provisions are considered. The process and schedule will contain details such as key participants and steps relevant to the subject FMP.

2. Initiate an "Amendment 28 post-mortem" by requesting the EFH Project Team to consider how to conduct a survey of all interested individuals to gather the lessons learned and recommendations for EFH review procedures. The PT should report back to the Council with plans for such a survey.

3. Develop groundfish EFH review guidelines after receiving the post-mortem survey feedback and prior to initiating the next full EFH review.
