CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE REPORT ON PACIFIC SARDINE ASSESSMENT, HARVEST SPECFICATIONS, AND MANAGEMENT MEASURES – FINAL ACTION

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) is providing the following details on commercial Pacific sardine (sardine) landings in support of Pacific Fishery Management Council (PFMC or Council) discussions regarding annual specifications for the fishery.

Sardine are landed incidentally in several coastal pelagic species (CPS) fisheries, including northern anchovy, Pacific mackerel, and market squid. They are also landed in a variety of non-CPS fisheries, such as groundfish trawl fisheries including Pacific whiting and prawn trawl. Since 2015, incidental sardine take has been limited to not more than 40 percent by weight in CPS fisheries, except the targeted live-bait fishery and, since 2018, the minor directed fishery. With sardine declared overfished in June 2019, incidental landings are now limited to not more than 20 percent by weight while directed take in the live-bait fishery is still allowed.

The incidental occurrence of sardine in particular fisheries is variable, depending on year, season, and fishery (Table 1). Landings with greater than 20 percent incidental sardine happened most frequently in the northern anchovy fishery but have been seen in all other fisheries with the exception of jack mackerel (Table 2). On average, 2,260 mt of sardine have been landed each season since the closure of the directed sardine fishery for seasons 2015-2016 to 2018-2019; with the vast majority of landings coming from the live bait industry (Table 3).
