Overview of Tables

In this appendix, there are three pages of demographic and labor information for each county:

- Information on population, including past and future estimates, race and Hispanic origin information, population of cities and towns, and the age structure of that population.
- Information about the county's workforce, including major categories of occupation, labor force by gender, and educational attainment information.
- Information about employment by Standard Industrial Classifications (SIC), labor and proprietor income information, and the county's export base.

The population page contains information on change over time, population of cities and towns and reservations and trust lands (including Census designated places, which are unincorporated), race and Hispanic origin percentages, and the age structure of the population.

Hispanic origin is not a subset of race and a person who indicates Hispanic origin can be of any race and is counted in one of the race categories as well as in the Hispanic origin category. The other race category includes write-in entries not included in the other categories.

Occupation: Of special note, the farming, forestry, and fishing category includes most agricultural related occupations, logging and other forestry occupations, and commercial hunting, fishing, and trapping occupations. People involved in other aspects of these industries (food processors or fish processors, for example) are categorized according to the work they do within those industries (laborer or clerk, for example).

Labor force by gender and educational attainment:

Employment and labor and proprietor income: Employment and income information are based on SIC to show major groups of employment in the county. For Washington, 1992 estimates were used. For Oregon and California, 1991 estimates were used. Employment includes full-time, part-time, and self-employed workers. Labor income includes sources of employee compensation (salary or wages, and non-cash compensations such as health and life insurance). Proprietary income includes payments received by the self-employed sector (business owners, lawyers, doctors, for example). Income does not include property derived income.

The agriculture, forestry, and fishing category may be misleading as it contains few forest-related sectors. This category tends to be dominated by agriculture, and fishing plays a major role in some counties.

Export base: The export base is the income derived from the direct or indirect sale of goods and services to entities outside of the county. In coastal counties, fish and fish products tend to rank high in this category. The information contained in Appendix A lists the top ten exporting industries for each county based on 1991 IMPLAN (Minnesota IMPLAN group, 1994) data and using the following criteria. The proportion of the total industrial output exported from the county was calculated for each industry. This proportion was used to calculate the proportion of total income related to exports for each industry and the industries were then sorted based on export income. The ten highest are chosen for inclusion in this section.
